Have Dahlia Plants Over Nine-Foot Tall

Dahlia plants that grew and grew, and grew have now extended upward past the top of the window at the home of the Walter Schweizer home on 2245 Maple Avenue.

This may be the end of their climb but if they grow much more they'll be on the roof.

Some varieties of dahlia plants grow five to six feet tall, our gardening expert says, but any as tall as this-over nine feet's never seen or heard of.

Although the nine foot plants provide a lot of green even from the point of partially blocking the view from the front windows, the blooms on it are few and small. We did not estimate that they were no more than 2 1/2 to 3 inches across.

Our gardening authority also tells us that some dahlia plants which have blooms on them as large as dinner plates. Apparently the plants at the Schweizer home have exceeded that they have none left to produce big blooms.

Mrs. Schweizer also informs us that they grow some exceptionally tall ones in a small garden in their back yard.

Questioned about the secret formula for growing things, her and her husband have, Mrs. Schweizer related that they have none.

"Except for some manure which I work into the ground and a little commercial fertilizer we have used, the soil has gotten no special care," Mrs. Schweizer concluded.

Subdivisions League Opens Drive for Books

The League of Subdivisions has now started an organized campaign to raise money for books for the Farmington City and Township Library.

The Library has a capacity for 25,000 to 30,000 books. At present the book stock is approximately 12,500 volumes, 5,000 of which are on loan to the Library through the Public Library Development Plan. These 5,000 books must be returned by March, 1962, at the rate of one third of the volumes per year. The first third is due back in Lansing by March, 1960. When the loan was granted to Farmington, it was with the understanding that the community would place a like number of books in its own shelves within three years.

The Library must add books to meet the needs of its patrons and replace worn and out-dated volumes. Library officials stated.

The League's Drive is organized by individual subdivisions, with representatives appointed to solicit funds within their own area. Each representative is equipped with a list of suggested titles book plates for the donor to fill out, request forms to designate how money is to be used, and postal cards for the donor to address to the library.

The lists are only suggestions. Other suggestions are welcome, either by specific title or by subject. Money that is not allocated for a specific title will be used for general book replacements, additions, and reference works.

The Party has already opened in several subdivisions, with other subdivisions starting in the near future. Groups and persons wishing to work on the drive should contact Dwight Gordon, chairman of the library committee, or Richard Sealey, president of the League of Subdivisions.

The League urges all groups within the City and Township to work on this drive with them.
