

It's A Sweet Smell of Bread At Taystee's New Depot Here

A new Farmington business executive has a strange office. It's permeated with the sweet aroma of fresh bread. The businessman is Robert Gaylord, a 33-year-veteran with American Bakesies. Taystee Bread division, which recently opened in Farmington at 33800 West Nine Mile, a short distance west of Farmington Road. Gaylord's office in the new depot here compares to a housewife's kitchen after a few loaves of home-made bread have been baked in the oven. For 23 years, the depot maintains 12 delivery trucks with 12 drivers, there are three route supervisors, four garage maintenance men, three loading and unloading personnel, a store clerk and the depot manager. The total staff numbers 54. Although the depot offers a variety of baked goods, bread is the main item. The bread is made in Detroit at a huge baking plant on Martin avenue. It is delivered by trucks to the local outlet late at night and early in the morning. The semi-trucks which deliver huge quantities of baked goods here are specially-constructed with a temperature-controlled closed van assuring freshness. The smaller route delivery trucks are similarly-equipped. The depot building temperature is also thermostatically controlled to prolong the freshness of the baked goods.

TPS LARGE enough to accommodate the early morning activities of 35 route delivery trucks being dispatched to numerous communities in this area. The new depot here was built, this past summer to assure better service to retailing outlets in this northwest metropolitan area. The 35 route trucks serve more than 15 communities among which are: Farmington, Livonia, Northville, Royal Oak, Pontiac, Ferndale and Garden City. The Farmington depot which opened Sept. 24, is one of two new depots to be included in the new system. The new depot here in Farmington offers an improved service to retailers, said Gaylord. "It assures the freshest bread possible," he added. THE DEPOT handles a variety of baked goods to include bread, buns and rolls. It also handles the well-known Green cake line. For 23 years, the depot maintains 12 delivery trucks with 12 drivers, there are three route supervisors, four garage maintenance men, three loading and unloading personnel, a store clerk and the depot manager. The total staff numbers 54. Although the depot offers a variety of baked goods, bread is the main item. The bread is made in Detroit at a huge baking plant on Martin avenue. 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
