Timely Tips on GARDENING

STATISTICS—Recently published statistics show that the population of Farmington has increased tremendously in the past 8 years. Farmington city itself has grown 130 percent, and the township shows an increase of over 112 per cent. This growth, which is part of a nationwide trend, is accompanied by a widespread interest in gardening, and this has made gardening a big business. The demand for lawn seed and nursery stock have more than doubled since 1950, and sales of flower seeds and plants have risen 50 per cent.

It has been estimated that during the current gardening year the nation's gardeners spent two billion dollars on tools, supplies, power units and insecticides. Last year \$400,000,000 was spent on grass, flower, and vegetable seeds, \$750,000,000 on nursery stock, and over \$50,000,000 on mulches.

PLAN BEFORE PLANTING—Before you spend your gardening dollars, it is wise to do some advance planning. Now, if you are remodeling their yard, you should formulate a definite landscape plan before doing any planting. The plan can be as simple or as complicated as you wish, and can include a wealth of material or only the barest minimum of plants.

The front area should serve as a setting for the house and provides a welcome for the visitor. The planting should be kept simple and dignified. Evergreens are the most popular choice because they provide color all year, and the less expensive deciduous material may be included for textural contrast and to provide variety of form.

Backyards serve as an outdoor living area and shrubs and flowers planted in this area are like the furnishings and decorations inside the house. Plans generally include a border of flowering shrubs around the edge of the yard. This will make the yard more colorful and provide a background for other plantings. Flower beds and specimen plants provide a decorative filigree and trees provide comfort necessary for summer comfort.

Nurses for general provide a landscape service and will help the gardener with his landscape plans.

The Farmington library has many good books on the subject of landscape planning that the "do it yourself" planner will find most helpful.

Before purchasing any stock, and before digging any holes, think of the yard as a whole. Rather than setting shrubs and trees in a random manner, prepare a plan that will unify the plantings and that will give the greatest effect from the material planted. No matter how large the property or how small the yard, it can be well landscaped. The gardener plans before he plants.

SUMMER BULBS—Now, as the daffodils and tulips are put into the ground, is the time to dig up the summer flowering bulbs, Dahlias, glads, clivia, and tuberous begonias are all removed from the ground and stored indoors during the winter.

Ghidious bulbs, or corms, can be dug up when the foliage has become yellow or brown. This will come as a natural aging process with bulbs that were planted early and flowered early in the season, or with the later blooming ones that will be browned by frost. Don't dig the bulbs until the top of the bulb is firm, plant
