

New Shepherd King Lutheran Dedication Services Nov. 1-5

Services of dedication and installation for the new Lutheran Church of the Shepherd King located at West Maple and Middlebelt (in West Bloomfield) have been announced by David T. Schwelb, congregation president.

The recently completed \$150,000 contemporary structure will be formally consecrated in a series of services, Nov. 1-5, during which the Rev. A. Karl Boehmke will also be installed as first permanent pastor of the mission parish.

The initial service of dedication will be held Sunday, November 1, at 10:30 a.m. with the opening of the doors and procession of the congregation into the church. Speaker for the occasion will be the Rev. Arthur of the English District, Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

IN AN AFTERNOON service at 4 o'clock, Nov. 1, furnishings given to the congregation's Book of Memorials will be consecrated to the glory of God. The service will be the Rev. Hugo G. Kleiner, President of the English District and Chairman of the Missouri Synod's Board for Higher Education.

On Monday, November 2, at 8 p.m., the Rev. A. Karl Boehmke, will be installed as the church's first permanent pastor, with Rev. Kleiner conducting the rite of installation, assisted by clergymen from neighboring Lutheran churches.

An eleven-rank Fousier pipe organ will be dedicated on Tuesday evening, November 3, at 8 p.m.

General Chairman for the dedication celebration is Donald C. Katterman, of Farmington. Others on the committee include Robert F. Watts in charge of ushering, James R. Loupe in charge of evangelism, Mrs. Robert Watts in charge of secretarial service, Mrs. James Loupe in charge of publicity, Mrs. Donald Karrow in charge of supper and refreshments, Mrs. Clifford Williams in charge of entertainment, Mrs. David Schwelb, hostess, and Mr. and Mrs. George Rayman in charge of the new church.

The church itself is constructed of rough-faced tan brick with laminated spruce beams and large window areas. Small circles of bright panes of glass in red, blue, green and gold add color and interest to the wooden paneling on the front exterior of the building. This becomes especially attractive at night when indoor lighting reflects on the colors. The chapel proper will seat 175 in pews, with over 600 space for another 125. A Fellowship Hall extends across the rear of the building, with a stage at one end and a kitchen at the other.

REV. A. KARL BOEHMKE has served the congregation since its inception. He is a native of Buffalo, N.Y., having studied at Concordia College, Bronxville, N.Y., and Concordia Theological Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri.

He was ordained in 1944 in Washington, D.C., where he founded Pilgrim Lutheran congregation.

He was commissioned in the U.S. Air Force Reserve in 1950 and served in active duty for two years during the Korean action. He subsequently studied at Yale Divinity School, New Haven, Conn., receiving the degree of sacred theology degree. He also served as pastor of Calvary Lutheran Church, Leonia, N.J., from 1953-1956.

He is a reserve chaplain with the 60th Troop Carrier Wing, Selfridge Air Force Base.

Rev. Boehmke, his wife and three children, live at 3201 Harislock Woods Dr., West Bloomfield Township.
