

Timely Tips on

GARDENING

Autumn's golden days lure the gardener down nature's trails. On bright sunny days fall color shows to best advantage and on such days it is sheer delight to ramble down woodland paths or stroll through open meadows. The crisp air is scented with the crimson and gold of tree foliage, while gleaming red berries of Solomon's seal and nightshade add a touch of brilliant color to the landscape. Rainy days are also good, for they add points of special interest.

DRY MATERIAL—As one ramble along country roads, dry flower stalks and oddly shaped seed pods are much in evidence. These can be collected for interesting "dry arrangements." Heavy spikes of dried corn cobs, the prickly-looking cones of fescue, and dried pods of peas that are like a study in modern abstract design are all readily available and are of interest to the collector. They have interesting form and hue and have a long lasting quality. Dried heads of Queen Anne's lace, or as it is sometimes called, birds nest flower, can also be used. Partially opened heads of goldenrod can be dried and used for winter bouquets, as can a variety of garden flowers. One way to preserve them is to hang them upside down in a dark place until they are dry. Goldenrod retains its color well, and many gardeners have good success with blue cornflowers, and marigolds, as well as with the more popularly used cockscomb, and straw flowers.

TULIPS—Now is the time to prepare a garden display for next spring. Crocus and scilla, and grape hyacinths herald the season, but are only the overture to greater glories yet to come. As the season unfolds, daffodils and other members of the narcissus clan share the spotlight and the show reach

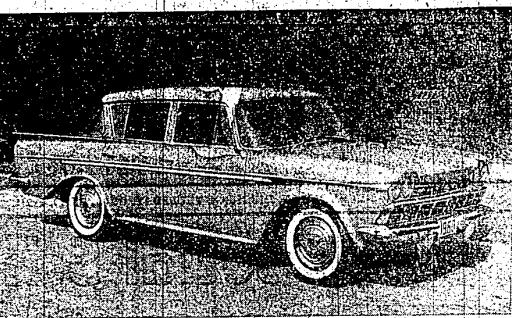
Notice Relative to Opening and Closing of the Polls

'60 Rambler Slightly Shorter But Offers Same '59 Roominess

Featuring fresh sculptured styling, economy of operation and a new three-seat station wagon, the 1960 line of Rambler Six and Rebel V-8 models went on sale yesterday October 14.

The new models are slightly shorter than comparable 1959 models but have the same roomy interior dimensions including five tie-down seats for six passengers. The more compact exterior will permit even greater parking space and maneuverability, Ray Abernethy, vice president of automotive distribution and marketing of American Motors Corp., said.

"While maintaining full seat, leg or luggage room, overall length has been reduced up to four inches," Abernethy commented. "This was made possible by the design of the new bumpers and bumper guards. Wheelbase length remains at 108 inches. Overall length of both the 1960 sedan and station wagon is less than 16 feet (189.5 inches), making the Rambler more than 2/3 foot shorter than other top-selling cars."

HORSEPOWER of the Rambler Six remains at 127, while the Rebel V-8 has been reduced to 200 horsepower for increased fuel economy. Optional power-packs will increase the Six to 138 horsepower and the Rebel V-8 to 215. "Further fuel-economy saving is possible because regular grade gasoline is recommended for all models," Abernethy said. "The 1960 Rambler's distinctive styling, retain the basic characteristics which helped push Rambler sales to an all-time high level in 1959 and to bring about the new revolution in the automobile industry," Abernethy said.

"American Motors follows a continuing program of basic car improvement, avoiding change for the mere sake of change. Adherence to this policy is one of the reasons why Rambler resale value tops the other low-price makes, thereby protecting the investment of the owner," the Rambler's new styling includes slimmer roof pillars which increase the glass area by 7 per cent for greater road visibility. Both the new windshield and rear windows are slanted at a greater angle to reduce wind resistance. With the slimmer and slanted front-end, front-door entrance room is increased by as much as 3 1/2 inches, making the Rambler one of the easiest cars to enter, Abernethy said.

The unadorned low and broad hood provides maximum road visibility as well as easy access to the engine compartment. The hood line flows smoothly into the front fenders.

BOTH THE GRILLE and the front and rear bumpers are made of two pieces to reduce possible repair costs. The grille is a heavy die-casting. The modified and canted fins run from the leading edge of

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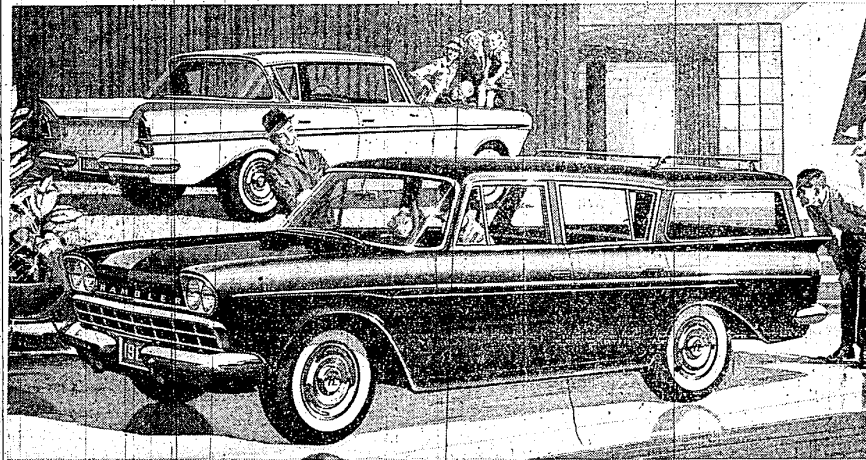
