 Last year more than two million American youngsters participated in the biggest project ever carried out by children to help children.
 Each penny collected by the UNICEF black and orange tag this Halloween can mean five glasses of milk for a needy child over-seas, or 30¢ vaccine to protect him from tuberculosis. A nickel's worth of UNICEF pencils will cure a child of yaws, a crippling tropical disease.

Dr. Rosy Pool, teacher of child author and martyr, Anne Frank, will be the guest of the Mercy College Alumnae for an informal lecture on Sunday, October 25th at 8:00 p.m. in the Meekley Auditorium on the college campus.
 The public is invited; there is no charge.
 Dr. Pool, of Amsterdam, Holland, where the Frank family fled to escape the Nazis, is a girl of 12, just before the family were forced to hide in the famous loft. She knew Anne as a quiet, sensitive child who was even then, showing great talent for expressing herself in writing.

Dr. Pool was head of "The Amsterdam School for Adult Learning," a special school set up for refugees who were forced to learn practical skills, such as shoe repairing, cake decorating or sewing that were beyond the boundaries of their native lands. These students, many of them brilliant scholars, in turn taught the refugees who were forced to go there when the Nazi expelled them from the Dutch schools.

It was in a course of literature that Dr. Pool first noticed Anne, and it was to Dr. Pool that Mr. Frank, Anne's father, brought the now famous diary.
 Dr. Pool, who was herself confined to a concentration camp, is an author, teacher and currently, a script writer for the British Broadcasting Company. She is in the country on a Fulbright travel grant, working under the auspices of the Department of State in Washington, D. C.

The Mercy College Alumnae, sponsors of Dr. Pool for the October 25 lecture, will entertain her and her friends from London, England, Miss Ursula Isenberg, a radiologist, at a small dinner at the college before the meeting.
 Miss Helen Mikusko, Dean of Women for Mercy College, and a '68 graduate is program chairman.
