Pay Range For Starting Teacher Wide

The June 1959 education graduate of a Michigan college or university beginning teaching this fall will earn anywhere from \$6,600 to \$9,000, according to Thomas J. Northey, special assistant in research for the Michigan Education Association.

Northey based his findings on figures released from 10 Michigan colleges and universities offering education programs, and degrees in education from Hillsdale and Hope colleges, Wayne State and the University of Michigan are not yet available.

Average salaries run as low as \$4,100 for Indiana College graduates, as compared to a high of \$4,700 at the University of Detroit.

The lowest salary—\$3,600—was recorded at Michigan State University. An MSU graduate will also receive the highest \$4,000, which is an Alaskan placement.

Consumers Building New District Service Center

Construction of a large new service center to house Consumers Power Company's West-Wayne district operations is now under way. The new 10-acre site on Farmington road, near Plymouth road, is now under way. Division Manager David H. Gerhard of Consumers announced.

The company's West-Wayne district includes the communities of Livonia, Plymouth, Northville, Farmington, Southfield, South Lyon, Novi, Walled Lake, and Wixom. The district extends from Inkster road in Wayne county west to Plymouth road in Van Buren road to the city of Wayne north to Fifteen Mile road.

Gerhard said the installation building with an area of 38,000 sq. ft. will include a two-story office square foot and an attached warehouse and service building with an area of 30,000 square feet. The site will be attractive landscaped, with large parking areas for employees and customers.

He said the center will be completed in about a year, and will house some 220 Consumers employees. The present Plymouth office will be continued as a combined business and appliance sales office. Offices in Wayne and Farmington will also remain.

In addition to offices and service facilities, the new service center will have an appliance sales floor, customer service office and an auditorium capable of seating 200 people, which will be used for employee meetings and for consumer keeping demonstrations by the company's home service department.

"Our choice of the Livonia location and the decision to consolidate our West Wayne District facilities were based on an overwhelming consideration of the company's home service department."

"Mr. Gerhard said. "Ten years ago the district served 10,500 natural gas customers. We now serve 35,000 in the district, and will be serving 40,000 by the end of the year."

Architect for the new service center are H. B. Beyer and Associates, Inc., Detroit. General contractor is the Perrow Construction Company, Detroit.

The building is of modern design, with an attractive brick, aluminum and glass entrance protected by three metal arches. The main office building will have a brick and aluminum and glass facade and the taller parts of the warehouse and service wing will have aluminum facing above a brick wall.

The site is on the west side of Farmington road about 500 feet north of Plymouth road.

Guard Against Disease Germs Via Seaway

Michigan is well protected against possible invasion of disease germs via the St. Lawrence Seaway, the state health department, director of disease control said.

Dr. F. S. Leeder explained that all ships must pass through a U.S.-Canadian quarantine inspection at Montreal before being allowed to enter the seaway.

At Montreal, passengers and crewmen are given physical checkups and their immunization records are checked. The vessels are inspected for rodents, insects and other disease carriers.

Cargoes also are inspected. Animals are checked for rabies and other diseases, and pilots and parakeets are checked for the avian disease known as "parrot fever." Lateral brushes are made from hog bristles and examined for anthrax germs.

"Vessels sailing on international waters," Dr. Leeder said, "must comply with international sanitary regulations adopted by the World Health Organization in 1953. These regulations require that all ships must receive before entering a country, inspection that is made for insects and vermin, and the isolation of persons who show signs of disease."

He said, the same regulations apply to airplanes on international flights, ending in Michigan.

"Smallpox is the only disease," Dr. Leeder said, "known to have been carried from one country to another in the last 100 years. Even so, a constant watch must be kept to prevent communicable diseases from entering this country."
