The mother of four children, Mrs. Redner is president and a director of General Filters with offices located at 43800 Grand River in Novi. She has distinguished herself nationally as a business woman and appears in the first edition of "Who's Who in American Women."

Mrs. Redner is also vice-president of Canadian General Filters, Inc., and trustee of Inter Vivos Trust, according to the Who's Who publication. From 1941 until 1958 when she was appointed president of General Filters in Novi, Mrs. Redner served as secretary-treasurer.

Born in Rutherford, Ontario, Canada, Mrs. Redner came to the United States in 1915 and was naturalized in 1939. Married in 1918 to Arthur Redner, they had four children: Ellen Louise (now Mrs. William B. Forrest), Roland Arthur, Robert Prescott and Ann Elizabeth.
