C'ville Meth. Starting New Church Fund Drive

In June 1941, Elsie Johns stood alone in the Clarenceville Methodist Church. A note left in the pocket read, "This church has no money and the congregation. Here's the key."

The building itself was quite a sight. The roof leaked, windows were missing and there was no plumbing. This was the Clarenceville Methodist Church, sadly needing a good cleaning but no congregation to pitch in and help.

Still it was a challenge and Elsie Johns has been meeting churches ever since. The church was cleaned, windows were replaced, plumbing was installed and life soon flowed into the building Sunday after Sunday.

The congregation grew and the sanctuary was remodelled to

accommodate them. The Sunday School membership swelled and the 11 room educational unit was added, with two buses purchased to pick up the pupils.

Before long the kitchen was outfitted, the dining hall finished and the recreation center completed. Year after year, and all this is now so small for the congregation that today numbers over 800. A challenge is before them.

Earlier this year five acres of ground was purchased on Middlebelt Road at Moran Street in Livonia. An architect has been retained and Clarenceville Methodist is growing again, with tentative plans calling for a 500 seat sanctuary, a 100 room educational unit to accommodate 1500 Sunday School pupils and a "Wayside Chapel" to be open for worship 24 hours a day.

These things will soon become a reality as the membership launches into a Mighty Fund Crusade, Beginning November 5 and closing November 13, with every member pledged to support this new venture.

Plan Special Services at Prince-Peace

Prince of Peace Lutheran Church (Missouri Synod) is joining with 309 other churches in Michigan participating in Lutheran Open House Week.

Albin J. Stanfel, pastor of Our Savior Lutheran Church, Thistle, Ontario, will be guest missionary speaker.

Pastor Stanfel is a native of the Michigan Copper Country having been born and raised in Calumet, Michigan.

He is a graduate of St. Louis (Missouri) Seminary and served mission congregations in Colorado and New Mexico during his vicarage.

Upon graduation from the Ontario District Deaconate of the Lutheran Church in Canada, he was assigned to a congregation in the northwestern corner of metropolitan Toronto.

The congregation, some 170 souls, plan to dedicate their church building in December of this year, their fourth anniversary.

Pastor Stanfel is married and has two children. During his stay here from Nov. 15 he will deliver the Sunday sermon and conduct night services from Monday through Thursday. Lay witnesses from Prince of Peace will call on others in the community and invite them to church.

These evening services, which each week-night will be from 8 to 9 p.m., Prince of Peace church members have now worshiping in their new church at 12 Mile just east of Farmington Road.

Sunday School is at 9:15 and church services at 10:30 a.m. each Sunday. Rev. Carl H. Mehl is pastor.

Top Organist To Play at Shepherd King
A special highlight of the dedication services at Lutheran Church of the Shepherd, King will be a recital of organ music by William Elfrig of the University of Michigan.

On Tuesday, Nov. 3, at 8 p.m., eleven rank Forewicks organ will be dedicated, followed by a recital of sacred music by Mr. Elfrig.

Mr. William Elfrig has an outstanding musical background. His study of organ began in high school days at North Park Academy, Chicago. At Valparaiso University, Elfrig studied with Dr. Heinrich Fleischer, presently organist at Rockefeller Chapel at the University of Chicago.

He graduated from Valparaiso University in 1935, receiving an award as outstanding organ student as well as the President's Award as outstanding senior student at the university.

Having been appointed a Dornthorpe Fellow by the Dornthorpe Foundation of St. Louis, Elfrig continued his music studies at the University of Michigan.

There he studied organ with Robert Voehrer, noted performer and authority on organ design and construction.

While doing graduate study at Michigan, Elfrig was elected to membership in Phi Kappa Phi, national honorary fraternity, and Pi Kappa Lambda, music honorary fraternity. He received the degree, Master of Music, in June, 1937.

During the year 1937-38, the young organist was a Dornthorpe Scholar at the Nordwestdeutsche Musikakademie, Detmold, Germany. There he had the privilege of studying organ and harpsichord with outstanding German teachers. While in Europe, Elfrig had an opportunity to hear and play many historic instruments dating from the 18th century, and representing some of the finest organs ever built.

The recitalist returned to the University of Michigan this past September to continue graduate study leading to the degree PH.D. He is a member of the teaching staff of the School of Music and director of Music at the Lutheran Student Chapel on the campus of the University.

First Methodist WSCS To Hear Talk on Africa

Guest speaker at a general meeting of the Women's Society of Christian Service of the First Methodist Church, Farmington, Tuesday, Nov. 14, at 8 p.m. will be Henry L. Bretton, associate professor of political science at the University of Michigan.

To be introduced by Mrs. William Harris, Professor Bretton's topic will be "Africa, Present and Its Future."

Bretton went to Germany in 1933 as a member of a field research team to study the West German election. In the summers of 1934 and 1935 he was recipient of Horace H. Rackham Fellowships and under these grants went to West Africa spending three months in Ghana and Nigeria.

Bretton's talk will climax an interesting study of Africa which the Mission Study program presented during October. Refreshments will be served by the Mary Martha Circle, Mrs. John Slagle, chairman.
