This is the tenth in a series of articles introducing you to members of the City of Farmington Department of Public Safety and the Farmington Township Police Department.

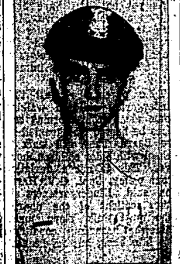
Patrolman Ronald R. Watson 23, is a 1934 graduate of Farmington high school and lives with his wife and children at 2804 E. Floral in Farmington.
