Asks Reduction In Lot Sizes

A request for reduction in minimum lot sizes for 58 acres of land located on 14-Mile between Farmington road and Orchard Lake road has been made to the township planning board.

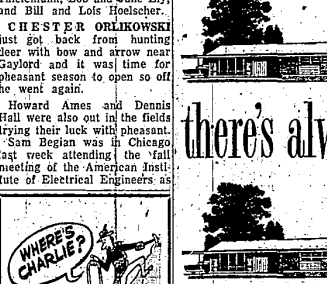
The matter was brought up Tuesday evening at the regular township board meeting only for information.

Robert Diehl, owner of the land, has asked that the minimum lot sizes within his 58 acres be decreased from 20,000 square feet to 12,500 square feet. The property is all zoned residential (R-4).

Originally, the property carried a minimum lot size restriction of 15,000 square feet. However, the township amended that restriction and boosted the minimum to 20,000. Diehl's request was made in an effort to create more lots and make them more readily saleable.

No action has been taken at this time by either board.

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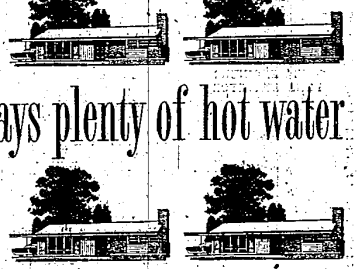
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
