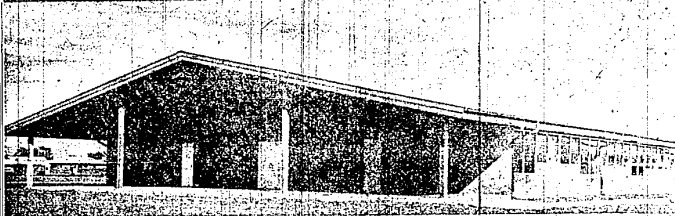
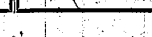

The Ceremony of Acceptance of the building will take place outside the building, weather permitting, following which will be the actual service of dedication. After the service, refreshments will be served to the guests by Prince of Peace Women's League, Mrs. William Bowditch, President.
THE PARISH-HOUSE Chapel is the first of a series of building programs which will eventually include school, church, side chapel, and administrative wing, according to present thinking.
It marks the culmination of 18 months of hard organizational work on the part of all members of the congregation. Starting with only one name, the congregation has grown steadily during the length of time. At the same time, it has established a full complement of auxiliary organizations and conducted two Vacation Bible School sessions. Its Sunday School now numbers 100 children and youth, exclusive of an adult Bible Class of 12.

The new church is located on New Market Road, just off the intersection of Twelve Mile and Farmington roads, and immediately across from the new Kendallwood Shopping Center.
Sunday School sessions are held at 9:15 a.m., and divine worship services at 10:30 a.m.

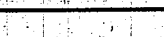
United Church Women World Community Day Program Set
Mrs. Jesse Jai McNeil, Detroit, will be guest speaker at the Women's Community Day Service of the United Church Women of Farmington.
The service will be held Friday, Nov. 6 at 1 p.m. in the chapel of the First Presbyterian Church of Farmington, Farmington Road at 11 Mile.
Mrs. McNeil was elected president of the United Church Women of Michigan last spring, the first negro woman to hold this top office.
UCW represents 17 denominations and 2600 protestant and orthodox churches in the state. She is also a vice-president of the National United Church Women, a member of the national human relations workshop of the UCU, the commission on cooperation of the World Council of Churches and the national board of managers of the church women's department of the National Council of Churches of Christ.
Mrs. McNeil was born in Damascus, Arkansas. She received her early education in Washington, D.C. and the MA degree in Sociology from Peabody College, Nashville, Tenn. in 1935. She has engaged in special post-graduate study and research in Social Psychiatry, Department of Neuro-psychiatry at Duke University, Durham, N.C. Awarded the National Public Service Fellowship for 1942-43 by the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, she did post-graduate study in Sociology at Columbia University, New York City.
Mrs. McNeil has held many important positions in the field of social service from the local area to world-wide areas.
She is listed in "Who's Who of American Women". She is both humble and happy in her work and is a true example of fine womanhood.
Her husband is the Rev. Dr. McNeil, senior minister of Detroit's Tabernacle Baptist Church. They have four children.

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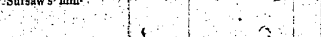
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At Home in Old Homestead
