Sociology Course Offered Seniors Termed 'Unique'

Unique in its educational approach is the sociology course offered seniors at Farmington High School. The course's individual's needs and abilities. This adaptability is the key to the sociology course's originality and effectiveness. Personal adjustment, marriage, and family living make up the three general areas covered in the course.

All topics and subtopics in the three general areas are listed in a large outline or syllabus of course study materials.

The sociology classes have already covered the area of family living. Presently working on the personal adjustment unit, the classes have had lectures and discussion, and have seen several movies and filmstrips on the subject.

Asked to comment on the aims and goals of the sociology course, Instructor Mrs. Bernice Vollmer quoted Rebecca McCann, "We study a trade or profession for years before we can hope for success, and yet though we want to have lives full of bliss we study our living much less."
