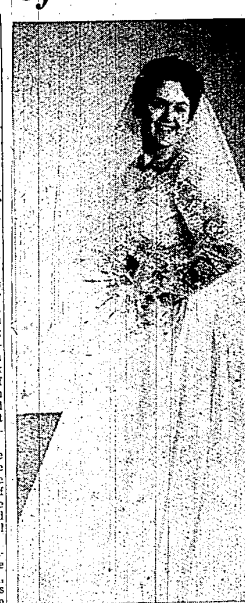

TB Testing Program To Start Here Nov. 16

Plans have now been completed to give tuberculin tests to all children in Farmington Township schools, both public and parochial, in grades 1, 3 and 5.

This will include children in the Clarendonville School District living in Oakland County.

Tuberculosis is still a major public health problem, officials of the Oakland County Department of Health emphasized.

The testing program will begin November 16.

Even though the decline in tuberculosis deaths has been rapid, the number of new cases is not declining in proportion. Between 1947 and 1953 the number of deaths declined 60 percent, but newly reported cases fell only 21 percent, health department officials noted.

One important problem has been that newly discovered cases are mostly far advanced and more serious.
