Nelson in New Justice Court

The location of the Farmington Township Justice Court conducted by Judge Robert Nelson has been changed.

It was moved yesterday to the Westbrook Centre which is located on Thirteen Mile Road at Orchard Lake Road. Court is now being conducted in a new building which has been constructed just south of the Manufacturers National Bank.

Judge Nelson, who took office on July 4, has been temporarily holding court within the Farmington city limits. This move out of the city into the township will provide a Justice Court which is both in and for the Township of Farmington.

Court hours will remain unchanged, that is, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on week days, excepting the noon hour, and 9 to noon on Saturdays.


