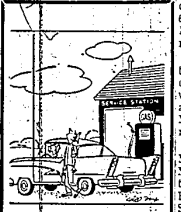

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF FARMINGTON PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICT OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that a special election will be held in Farmington Public School District, Oakland County, Michigan, on Monday, the 23rd day of November, 1959, from 7 o'clock A.M. to 8:00 o'clock P.M. Eastern Standard Time, to vote upon the following propositions:

- (a) Shall the unexpended balance of the proceeds of the \$1,300,000 School District Bonds, Series 1, dated January 1, 1959, heretofore issued by the Farmington Public School District, Oakland County, Michigan (which balance amounts to approximately \$163,000) be used to the purpose of defraying the cost of erecting and furnishing an addition to the O. E. Dunkel Junior High School Building?
- (b) Shall the Farmington Public School District, Oakland County, Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) and issue its bonds therefor to the purpose of defraying the cost of erecting and furnishing a new junior and senior high school building and new elementary school buildings, erecting and furnishing additions to existing school buildings, and acquiring school sites and adding to school sites?
- (c) Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed each year for school property in Farmington Public School District, Oakland County, Michigan, for all purposes except taxes for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1952 be increased as provided in Section 21 of Article X of the Constitution of Michigan, for a period of five (5) years from 1960 to 1964, both inclusive by two mills on each dollar, (\$2.00 per \$1.00) of the assessed valuation as equalized, for the purpose of paying a part of the operating expenses of said school district?

Variety of Tests Offered Thru FHS Guidance Office

Many Senior High students and their parents are unaware of the variety of educational tests offered to students through the Guidance Office. Some of these tests are required, but many are given upon request. The tests measure interests, abilities, and aptitudes, and are used as guides for both the student going to college and the student seeking a vocation immediately after high school.

Following is a list of tests offered to students in each grade:

- Grade 10: Money Problem Check List. This is a check list of social, economic, and educational problems common to sophomores. It is offered to all sophomores, but is not required. If requested, interviews may be made with the guidance personnel on the basis of the check list.
- Grade 11: Differential Aptitude Test. This is an aptitude test given to all juniors, or seniors, who request it, in December.
- Kuder Preference. This is an "interest inventory" given to juniors and seniors who request it.
- Lee Clark Arithmetic Test. This test, required of all juniors, indicates whether a course in Refresher Math is needed in the student's senior year. It is given in January, immediately after the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.

This test is offered to all juniors who register with the office and pay the \$1.00 fee for the test. It is to be given on March 19, 1960. Juniors who take the test may qualify for scholarships.

Grade 12: California Mental Maturity Test. This test is given to seniors who wish to measure their maturity. It must be requested.- Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test. This test is given in October to seniors who request it and to juniors who want practice in scholarship tests.
- Achievement Tests. These are tests given all over the country by the College Entrance Examination Board. All seniors who register for the test may take the test. The different choices of achievement tests are: English Composition; Social Studies; Intermediate Mathematics; Advanced Mathematics; Biology; Chemistry; Physics; French; German; Latin; Spanish.

The fee covers a maximum of three of these tests. Achievement Tests are given at Redford High School on December 1959, March 12, 1960, May 21, 1960; and August 10, 1960. A student may register for the tests a month before the date he wishes to take them. If he wishes, the score from these tests will be forwarded to the colleges of his choice.

Natural Nurses' Tests. This test is offered to all students interested in nursing. It is given at Wayne State University in December. Most nursing schools require the results of this test before accepting an applicant.

Students who desire to register for the various tests, or parents who want more information concerning them, should see or phone Miss Carley or Mr. Timmons of the Guidance Office.

Distributing Motor Vehicle Fund Receipts

Farmington City's portion of the state Motor Vehicle Fund collections for July-August-September is \$5,076.75. It was revealed recently by the Michigan State Highway Department. The highway department last week started distributing third quarter Motor Vehicle Fund monies to the counties and incorporated cities and villages of Michigan.

Oakland county will receive slightly more than \$841,000 and the two incorporated villages here, Quakerstown and Wood Creek Farms, will get \$1,054 and \$1,282, respectively.

Since Oakland county is charged with the maintenance of township roads, a portion of the county's Motor Vehicle Fund receipts will be diverted for specific use on Farmington township roads.

Net receipts of the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund for third quarter 1959 were \$41,650,903.

State gasoline, weight and diesel fuel taxes and a small amount of miscellaneous fees comprise the Motor Vehicle Highway fund. The third quarter collections from 1958 were \$38,294,000.
