Bird Feeding Station Opens At Kensington

The winter bird feeding station maintained by Vic Knowles of the Detroit Audubon Society in cooperation with the Huron-Ginton Metropolitan Authority is now in operation at Kensington Metropolitan Park near Millford.

The feeding station is located on Tamarack Nature Trail, just a few hundred feet from the Nature Center.

This activity gives persons who are familiar with Michigan winter birds residents an opportunity to get a close view of such birds as the Black-capped Chickadee, Blue Jay, Tufted Titmouse, Downy Woodpecker, White-breasted Nuthatch, Tree Sparrow, Cardinal and Slate-colored Junco.

To help visitors identify these birds, a poster with colored pictures showing several of the birds has been placed near the feeding station.

Various exhibitions remain on display at the Nature Center which is open daily 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. and open 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays.

Bill Hopkins, chief naturalist on the Huron-Ginton Metropolitan Authority, said that the nature trails will be open to park visitors during the winter season.

The Nature Center will be closed Thanksgiving Day.

Savings Bonds Interest Boosted

Recent Federal legislation, approved by President Eisenhower, has permitted the U. S. Treasury department to boost the interest rate on Savings Bonds from 3-1/4 percent to 3 3/4 percent. The increase is retroactive to June 1.

All Series E, and Series H bonds, whether old or new, will automatically be increased by one-half of one percent from the period from June 1, 1959, until their maturity.

The increase has been accomplished by reducing the term of the bonds to seven years and nine months. Previously, the bonds matured in eight years and 11 months.

There are also improved redemption values and investment yields if the new Series E bonds are held for less than the seven full years. All outstanding E and H bonds purchased prior to June 1, 1959, earn at least one-half percent more than before from now until their next maturity.
