

# Chapman's Efforts Dominate Farmington Football Statistics

Leading individual ground-gainer on the Farmington Varsity football squad this past season was a triple-threat quarterback, Harvey Chapman, who engineered the Falcons to a 2-2 overall record.

The Farmington gridgers also claimed a 3-2 card in league play, good for a share of second place in the standings.

During the eight-game schedule, Chapman personally accounted for 607 yards in 100 carries on the ground and added another 324 yards on 22 completed passes. He averaged 5.9 yards per carry and completed 44 percent of the 59 passes he attempted.

YARDAGE lost by Chapman has already been figured into the statistics, leaving only 176 yards on the ground and only 34 additional through the air.

Chapman connected for 22 scoring passes and personally tallied six touchdowns and bootlegged 11 extra points. His 40-point scoring total paced the Falcons in that column.

All told, Farmington's offense scored 106 points in the eight games while its opponents managed 62. The Falcons shut-out four of its victims and only Pontiac Northern, who defeated Farmington in the season's third game, scored more than 20 points against the 10-card team.

HALFBACK Jack Atchison lugged the football 74 times and gained 266 yards for a 3.5 average. Ron Rader carried 54 times for 181 yards and a 3.3 average. Other leading ground-gainers were John Dempsey and Warren Pierce, who each carried 22 times. Pierce gained 163 yards and Dempsey 69. Chapman led the way in an-

other department; too, in punt-ing, he kicked 24 times for 765 yards and a 31.8 average. Rader was the primary recipient of Chapman's aerial efforts. He gathered in eight of Chapman's passes for 119 yards. Dave Crouse, an end, also caught eight passes for 102 yards. Chapman had six of his tosses intercepted.

RADER and Crouse were runners-up in the yardage department. Rader tallied three touchdowns for 18 points and Crouse scored twice for a 12-point total. Six other Falcons each scored once. They were Atchinson, Dempsey, Pierce, Larry Hawkins, Russ Hofmeyer and Jim Wall.

Farmington's net yardage for the year was 1,738 compared to 1,540 for opponents. Of the Falcons' total, 1,371 was on the ground and 368 via the airways. The team's best game was a 30-0 victory over the 1959 Cardinals, 71 of which were by rushing.

THE FALCONS fumbled 11 times and lost the ball six times. On the other side of the ledger, opponents fumbled 20 times and lost possession nine times.

Farmington was penalized a total of 205 yards and opponents lost 270 yards for infractions. Sixteen Varsity gridgers from Farmington's 1959 squad will graduate in June. Twelve of them are seniors and one is a sophomore. The entire first-string offense will be missing next fall due to June graduation.

The regulation provides that the storage of hides and skins is prohibited unless separate storage rooms are provided for the storage of hides and skins leading into the locker room, chill room, aging room, or sharp freeze room are provided.
