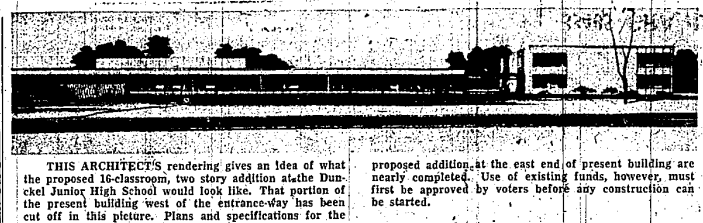

ment come due in 1961, it has been estimated that it will be possible to reduce the rates on previously approved bond issues enough to offset the rate added for the 1959 issue.

Proposition III
"Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed each year against property in Farmington Public School District, Oakland County, Michigan, for all purposes except taxes for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to Dec. 8, 1932, be increased as provided in Section 21 of Article X of the Constitution of Michigan, for a period of five (5) years from 1960 to 1964, both inclusive, by two mills on each dollar (\$2.00 per \$1,000) of the assessed valuation as equalized for the purpose of paying a part of the operating expenses of said school district?"
Like all other businesses, operating expenses for the Farmington School District continue to climb upward.
Because Farmington is an unbalanced community with considerable residential development but comparatively little industry or commerce, the brunt of the local tax burden to operate the continually expanding public school system must be borne by residential taxpayers.
THE TAX YIELD from residential property is very low compared to the yield from industrial and commercial establishments occupying the same amount of space.
To emphasize the fact that the Farmington School District is poor and getting poorer because it is not a balanced community, Supt. Harrison presented some statistics. Last year the district had a valuation of \$10,371 behind each pupil. This year's per pupil valuation has dropped to \$8,702, or \$669 less.
Farmington's 1958 per pupil valuation compared with the average of all school systems in Oakland County, was \$1,197 lower. It was \$3,885 lower than the average per pupil valuation for all school systems in the State of Michigan.
Farmington also had the second lowest equalized
