

Over 40 Boys Answer Call For Wrestlers

Wrestling practice started Tuesday, November 10, and is now going full tilt. Over 40 boys were at the first practice, and returning members this year are Don Hendry, Randy Jordan, Jerry Castle, Jack Callahan, and Dick Lam. First competition is next Thursday, December 3, with Edsel Ford, here.

In case you attend the wrestling matches, individual matches are scored as follows: Five points for a pin, two points for a takedown, two points for a reversal, a move by the wrestler from a disadvantageous position to an advantageous one, one point for an escape, a disadvantageous position to a neutral position, and one point for a technical foul.

If an illegal hold is used, the opponent may draw penalty points. A three fall or pin is worth three points, and if there is no pin, the match is scored as previously indicated.

Pontiac Northern, newest member of the league schools, is Farmington's next opponent on Thursday, December 10, there.

Last year Farmington's wrestling team was second in the league, and fourth in the regional standings.

High School Bowling League Is Formed

Errors Cost Several Chance For Permits

The element of human error cost nearly 13,000 applicants a chance to have their names drawn for a special deer hunting permits this year.

The figure represents almost six percent of the 211,155 applications submitted to the Conservation Department.

Failure to attach proper postage was the chief misdeed, eliminating some 5,500 applications. Approximately 3,800 applications were found to be incomplete. Slightly more than 2,900 failed to reach the department by the October 10 deadline while about 1,600 lacked signatures of their applicants.

Sixty Cagers Turn Out For Falcons' 1st Drill

Head Coach Bob Burtch was no pessimist last week as he discussed the fortunes of his Farmington High basketball team for the coming season.

On the other hand, he was no optimist either.

The Falcons opened their pre-season training sessions a week ago when nearly 60 hopeful cagers turned out for Burtch's first call. Farmington kicks off its new campaign Dec. 4 against Livonia-Bentley here.

Only one varsity letter-winner from last year's edition of the Farmington campaign this season. Fresh from the rigors of football, Harvey Chapman is the sole returning letter-man from 1954-55.

TWO OTHER members of the varsity squad from a year ago are also back again. Center John Anderson and forward Bill Smith are expected to bolster the Falcons. However, neither Anderson nor Smith played sufficiently last season to earn letter awards.

Although Burtch obtained a sneak preview look at the sophomores and juniors on Thursday, Nov. 12, practice sessions did not officially open until Monday, Nov. 18, when seniors and football players joined in.

Burtch estimated last week that the Varsity squad will be about equally comprised of juniors and seniors. He intends to carry a 15-member Varsity team during the season.

Chapman's presence for another season will somewhat ease Burtch's problems. Chapman, a triple-threat football player, was the Falcons' high scorer during the 18-game basketball campaign of a year ago. He tallied 370 points for a 15-point game average.

IN 1953-54, Farmington claimed a nine-win, nine-loss record overall and a 6-4 mark in league action good enough for a share of second place in the circuit. The Falcons rapidly jelled as the year progressed, winning seven of their last 10 regular contests.

Misgiving the Falcons will be hustling guard Tom Grimshaw and top-flight rebounder Kenny Cobb. Both Cobb and Grimshaw were lost June graduation.

One item that pleases Burtch is the fact that Farmington will play three of its first four games on the Falcons' home court.

Following Bentley on the agenda is Berkley High, league champ last season and fifth-ranked team in the state. Berkley's arrival here on Dec. 11 will remind many Farmington partisans of a highlight during last year's cage campaign.

IN THE LAST regularly scheduled game of the 1954-55 action, Farmington up-ended the high-flying Berkley cagers, 46-34, in a tightly fought battle.

After Berkley, the Falcons will journey to Walled Lake Dec. 16 and then will host Northville Dec. 19. The annual Christmas basketball tournament at Bentley High will be featured Dec. 20 during the Falcons' holiday vacation.

Fish for Trout Through Ice

More sport is in the offing for fishermen this winter following recent action by General Department Director Gerald E. Eddy.

Eddy issued an order designating 265 lakes and streams which will be open to book and line fishing for rainbow trout during January and February. The order also covers December of 1956.

Department fisheries officials consider the upcoming special winter season on rainbows beneficial to all concerned.

They stress the season will not jeopardize rainbow spawning stock or, consequently, rainbow populations in the designated lakes and streams. There is no natural reproduction of rainbows in most of these waters and populations are maintained solely by hatchery plantings of 1950.

For fishermen, the season will not only offer more sport but better catches. Rainbows are in better physical condition during the winter months than in the spring.

Previously, rainbows were frequently caught incidental to fishing for other species. This created a problem, both in fish mortality and law enforcement.

A listing of lakes and streams which will be open to the special rainbow season can be obtained from the Department's Lansing office or any of its district field headquarters.

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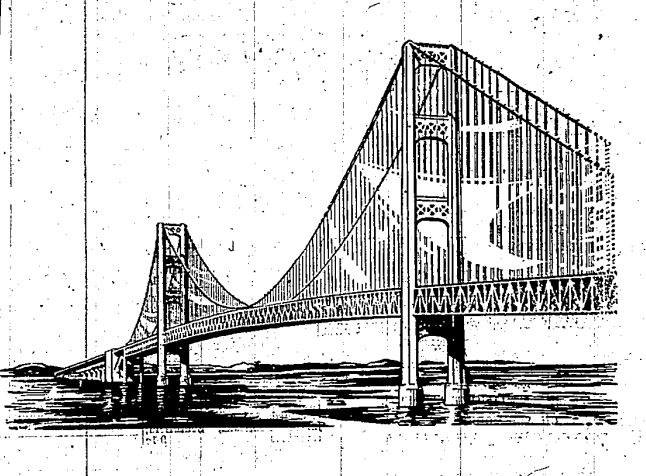
