Americans Will Spend \$5 to \$6 Billion to Keep Homes Warm

More than 15,000,000 Americans homes have turned on the heat for the winter season in the past few weeks. A total of seven and a half billion dollars will be spent to keep warm with oil, coal and gas over the next seven to nine months, according to the Oak and Oil Heat Council, in cooperation with the National Fuel Oil Council, in a report just released on home heating.

Home owners' fuel bills in the past few weeks have been up to the line, which make up the nation's primary heating area, will average about \$25.00.

Although the Council's make no weather prediction for the coming winter, it points out that last winter was generally cold on the East Coast; 2.5 per cent colder than normal and 4.7 per cent colder than the winter before; in the mid West, 1.1 per cent colder than normal and 3.3 per cent colder than the previous year.

OVER 90 percent of homes with heating equipment are kept warm with one of the three major fuels, and oil and gas are the two predominant modern heating fuels. Oil heats at most 17,000,000 homes, mostly in the North and the majority of them centrally heated, gas around 20,000,000, the majority in the south, and hard and soft coal about 7,000,000, about half-a-million homes use electricity, the greater portion in low-cost power areas.

Most oilheated homes, according to the Council's, are in the Northeastern quadrant of the U.S. and the Pacific Northwest, where over 60 per cent of the national population lives. To all states 400,000 additional homes will be heated with oil by the end of 1959, the Council's estimate, adding that oil-heating equipment is going into residences at a rate 10 per cent higher than at this time last year.
