New Plates on Heavy Trucks

Heavy duty trailer trucks and commercial vehicles are now wearing their new black on white half-year commercial plates. The new colors replace the maroon and yellow plates which were used from May 15 through November 14 this year.

Under the present statutes heavy commercial units weighing 4600 pounds with annual vehicle taxes of more than \$50.00 per year may use these half-year plates. They are on sale in all 83 Michigan counties at license bureaus.

Owners of lighter weight commercial vehicles paying weight taxes of \$50.00 or less buy full-year plates. The present green and yellow plates have been first sold on November 4, 1958, are valid through February 25, 1960. The owners of heavy duty trailers and commercial units purchase either full-year plates or half-year plates.
