Construction Accident Fatal For G. LaFond

Gordon J. LaFond, 30900 Orchard Lake Road, Farmington Township passed away November 25 in William Beaumont Hospital, Royal Oak from a construction accident, five days previous.

He was born in Trenary, Michigan July 6, 1921, the son of Louis J. and Florence (Maynard) LaFond and was united in marriage to Betty Jean Bailey October 8, 1941.

He was employed as an operating engineer for a construction company and had resided in Farmington six years.

Mr. LaFond leaves his wife, Betty Jean; one daughter, Cheryl Ann; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Louis J. LaFond of Rapid River, Michigan; and two brothers, Richard Allen LaFond of Kalamazoo and Ernest Edward LaFond of Redding, California.

He was a member of the Knights of Columbus, St. Francis No. 400, Southfield and the Veterans of Foreign Wars of Marine City. He had served in the United States Navy in World War II.

A Rosary service was recited at eight o'clock Friday evening at the Spencer J. Heeney Funeral Home, Massawogue St., Fabius Church, Farmington at 10:00 a.m. Saturday.

Interment was in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, Southfield.

Jehovah's Film Shown Here Wed. Night

E. S. Sarna, presiding minister of the Farmington North Unit of Jehovah's Witnesses, announced a free showing of the 14-hour color film "Divine Interference" at the Farmington North Unit of Jehovah's Witnesses, at the Kingdom Hall, 22882 Orchard Lake Road, December 2 at 7:30 p.m.

This was a special showing for the Farmington area. The "public" press, newsreel and other news channels give world-wide attention to this assembly last summer, acclaiming it as the world's largest Christian convention. For eight days it packed Yankee Stadium and the Polo Grounds in New York City. A quarter-million delegates from 123 lands were present at the climax of the event to hear Nathan H. Kautz, Watchtower Bible and Tract Society's president, speak on the subject, "God's Kingdom Rules Is The World's End Near?"

Opening sequences of the film picture the Bible words, "They Shall Beat Their Swords into Plowshares," carved on the United Nations headquarters building. It follows with living evidence that this prophecy can become a reality through knowledge of God's Kingdom.

Opening included the mass baptism of more than 7,000 persons at one of New York's beaches. An audience of 194,000 unanimously adopting a vow to maintain peace and unity of their ranks; foreign language sessions held in 20 languages. Two giant caterpillars feeding 1,000 meals a minute, peacemaking preparations to house 100,000 persons in the hotels and private homes of New York. On-location shots of Christ the active deity. Details Of Illinois Bonus Law Told Applicants In Michigan

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — The administrator of the Illinois Veterans' Commission, Mr. Ralph B. Johnson, has notified Michigan authorities that applications for payment of the Korean Bonus are now available to eligible Illinois veterans.

The law provides for payment of \$100 to all persons who served in the Armed Forces any time after June 27, 1950 and prior to July 27, 1953, providing they were residents of the State of Illinois at least 12 months immediately preceding entrance into the service, and were honorably separated or continued in active duty. The veterans must also have been awarded the Korean Service Medal.

Provision is also made for the payment of \$100 to the widow, children, mother, father, persons standing in loco parentis and brothers and sisters in that priority. In those cases where the serviceman died during the period of conflict or as a result of a service-connected disability if death occurred prior to January 1, 1953. It can be expected that the first annual check will be mailed on or about December 1, 1959.

Illinois Veterans now residing in Michigan may obtain application blanks by writing to the Illinois Veterans' Commission, 400 South Spring St., Springfield, Illinois, or your ANVETS Service Dept.

Loan Requests Up In October

WASHINGTON — Applications for home loan guaranty continued to gain slightly during October, while requests for appraisals and GI starts sagged, the Veterans Administration reported today.

October applications totaled 19,053 compared to 18,609 in September, the VA said, an increase of 2.4 per cent.

Requests for appraisals of existing units dropped 2.4 per cent from 10,724 in September to 7,681 in October, and appraisal requests for proposed units dropped 7.1 per cent from 7,626 in September to 7,057 in October.

Stove Explodes, Burns Suffered

James Silva of 20990 Kewwood, Farmington, suffered minor burns requiring a doctor's care last week when an oil stove blew up in his home.

The mishap occurred shortly before 7 a.m. Saturday morning. Firemen from the Wheeler Street fire station responded to the call. No fire damage was done in the house but the stove was completely destroyed.

This was the seventh such fire call answered by volunteers from this one station, alone in the township during the month of November, the fire chief reported.

All persons who have not already done so are urged to give their homes a thorough inspection and cleaning immediately.

Village Asks Legal Advice

Disapproval of the collection of \$250 from all applicants for new home building permits to finance the Farmington Interceptor Sewer was again expressed by the Wood Creek Farms Village Council Tuesday night.

The council contends that there is no need for a sewer system in the village at this time and it is unfair to collect a fee for this purpose from persons constructing new homes when they may not be able to derive any benefits for some years yet. Councilmen were quick to add, however, that they did not want to "close the door" on a tie-in if and when it found to be advantageous later.

It was agreed that legal advice was needed. The matter will be turned over to the village attorney for study.
