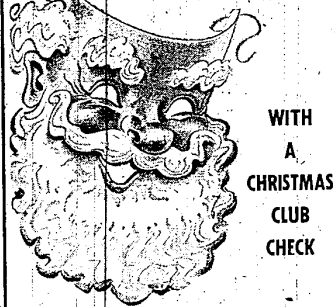

The parents of the Longacre elementary school students will meet at the school Monday evening, Dec. 7 at 8:00 p.m. to pass on two proposals.

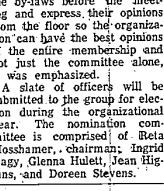
