The Encyclopedia Britannica is a memorial item to several of our late residents.

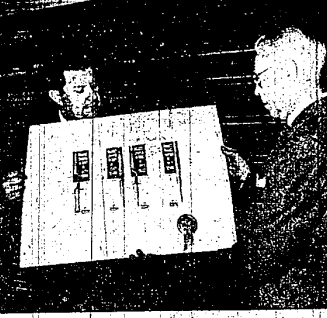

The various members of the Future Teachers Association were assigned, according to their interests, to visit specific schools in the Farmington public school system. This project to co-ordinate teaching, which is becoming more and more widespread in the Future Teachers Associations through the United States, took place on Friday, December 4.

Twenty seven students in the Farmington chapter participated in this program. The purpose of the program is to provide the opportunity for young people who are considering the field of education to see if they have aptitude in this field, and if they do, where this aptitude lies.
