State Heads of Citizens For Michigan Selected

Three men of prominence in Michigan business and public life have been named to head the key statewide study committees of Citizens For Michigan, a non-partisan organization which is seeking to resolve state problems through citizen-study and action.

The newly-appointed chairman and his committee are: Roy L. Stephens, Jr., business executive and Detroit school board member, state services committee; Howard J. Stoddard, Lansing bank president, state finance committee.

The three committees will direct and coordinate citizen study activities during the coming months in the critical areas of what state services are needed and desired by citizens; how the state government can best be structured to provide the indicated services; and how both government and services can be adequately financed to meet voter requirements.

Maximum citizen participation in organized study of the key problem areas is to be achieved through local chapters. Local study group appraisal of the facts bearing on the major study areas will be coordinated by the statewide study committees, and recommendations jointly developed that truly represent broad citizen opinion.

"The work of these study committees is essential to the final effectiveness of the Citizens For Michigan movement," George Romney, state CPM chairman, declared.

"Objective marshalling of the facts and formulation of recommendations by citizens, not politicians, is the foundation for an informed position to resolve the present breakdowns in state government. Only in knowledge of the facts can citizen support be built of sufficient breadth and intensity to command the

response of the two political parties through which citizens traditionally control their government."

Allen served eight terms on the Kalamazoo City Commission and four consecutive terms as mayor, 1951 to 1959. He is the immediate past president and a trustee of the Municipal League and a member of the President's commission on inter-governmental relations. He served as legislative chairman of the Detroit Council of Parent Teacher Associations, 1955-1957, and as chairman of the finance sub-committee of the Detroit Citizens' Advisory Committee on School Needs, 1957-1958. He was elected to the Detroit Board of Education and services, can be contacted in 1959.

Stoddard is one of the organizers and presidents since 1940 of the Michigan National Bank. He is director of The Michigan Bank of Detroit and insuredance companies in Battle Creek and Lansing. He has been active as a legislative counselor on financial matters since serving as Michigan representative for the Reconstruction Finance Corporation in the 1930's, to assist in the rehabilitation of the state's banking structure. He resides at 736 Glenhaven Ave., East Lansing.
