### A & W Will Build Fence to End Nuisance

A solid masonry wall and car stops will be built by Mike Wallace for the A & W stand on Grand River for its reopening next spring, as the result of an agreement Monday night with city councilmen.

Residents nearby complained last summer of the noise and nuisance through evening hours, and the city council ordered a wall to be built within 30 days. However, the stand closed for winter before that time.

THE OWNER proposed construction of a six-foot wooden fence, but councilmen told him their experiences with such fences and their belief a masonry fence would be cheaper in the long run.

There is a 20-foot alley north of the driveway property. The masonry fence, four or more feet in height, will be built at the north edge of the alley. Then concrete car stops will be placed on the driveway property so that the alley will be kept clear.

### Mrs. L. Harger Rites Monday

Mrs. Lillian E. Harger of 21-302 Whittington Ave. and a resident of Farmington for the past forty years, passed away at her residence on Thursday morning, December 31.

Mrs. Harger was born December 30, 1879, in Chicago, Illinois, the daughter of George B. and Emma Caroline Hammond Bent. She attended school in Chicago and in June 14, 1900 was united in marriage to Sayrs D. Harger, Mrs. Harger was a member of the Farmington Methodist Church and had been an ordained worker and Sunday School teacher in the church for many years.

Mrs. Harger rested at the Thayer Funeral Home until Monday afternoon when funeral services took place at 2:00 p.m. from Farmington First Methodist Church with Rev. Richard T. Marshham officiating. Burial took place in Oakwood Cemetery, Farmington.

Surviving besides Mr. Harger are a daughter, Mrs. Robert Hoyt of St. Clair Shores, and her sons, Dallas of Rockford, Michigan; Rev. Cedric Harger of Flint, Dr. King Harger of Los Angeles, California, and Lester of Cleveland, Ohio. She also leaves one sister, Mrs. Nettie Hintze of Billings, Montana, twelve grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren.

### Land Sells for \$1.25 per Acre Back in 1830

Back in 1830, Michigan was "out of this world."

"You write to me of your wonderful country and I am of the world, Michigan," says Quaker girl Elizabeth Chandler, whose letters are in The University of Michigan Historical Collections.

Elizabeth Chandler came from Philadelphia in 1830 (she was then 21) with her brother Thomas and Aunt Ruth Evans to settle in a log cabin in a rolling country between Adrian and Tecumseh.

Describing her new life in Michigan Territory, Elizabeth wrote Jane Howell, another woman in Philadelphia; "Our house is by no means spacious. The logs, both inside and out, have been squared off by an expert axman. The doors are walnut, which is in very common use here. The windows are neatly framed and glazed, which latter operation was performed by Aunt Ruth and myself. Our beds are of straw mattress, on which I assure thee we sleep very comfortably; are both of my brother's manufacture. During several weeks ago, it went up snugly and safely. There was a large number of hands, between 40 and 50 all together, and if they had happened to step in on the afternoon or morning before the raising, they would have found Aunt Ruth and me quite deeply immersed in the preparation of pies, puddings and cake."

"The report of land selling here at 50 cents an acre is not correct," Elizabeth relates. "At least we have not heard of it. In Michigan, Emigration is rapid enough at \$2.25 an acre. But half lots (40 acres) are now sold to actual settlers, but not less than 60 acres to those who purchase by speculation."

"There has been a great deal of good sleighing here this winter but we have not availed ourselves of it as much as we probably should have done had we been provided with some better means of conveyance than our ox sleigh. It is too slow a way of traveling, unless for a short distance. But we shall not keep sheep for a year or two - as they are rather troublesome for a new settler on account of the wolves. The howl of a wolf is not nearly so dismal a sound as I had expected, much less so than that of a dog. It is softer and more hollow, and the stillness of the night sounds not unusual. But it is a strange contrast with the east - a twelve o'clock 'of the watchman.'"

### 1959-60 U.S. School Statistics Released by Education Assns.

The Michigan and National Education Associations have released their most recent estimates of pupil enrollment, school revenues, the teacher situation, and other school information for the year 1959-60.

The estimates cover data for the 50 states as well as for the nation as a whole.

The report titled "Estimates of School Statistics, 1959-60," shows:

- 1) Pupil enrollment in public elementary and secondary schools is \$389-up 5.4 percent over last year.
- 2) Total instructional staff is 1,435,338-up 4.3 percent over last year. Of every eight classroom teachers, with about one in 14 an emergency (not fully certified) teacher.
- 3) The average classroom teacher salary is \$8,225-up 4.8 percent. Elementary teachers average \$6,853 and high school teachers average \$9,824. It is estimated that one out of every eight teachers will be paid less than \$5,000. The Far West continues to have the highest salary average and the Southeast the lowest.
- 4) The turnover of instructional staff has increased slightly - 1.2 percent. An estimated 122,700 persons, or 8.5 percent of the total instructional staff, will be leaving the states' public schools for old age, disability, to take other positions or other reasons.
- 5) The number of school districts estimated to have dropped from 43,500 last year to 40,505 for 1959-60.
- 6) For the first time this year, the MEA-NEA estimates include average pupil enrollment and average daily attendance along with enrollments. The school-

informed and immediately cited him for contempt of court.

THE CONTEMPT trial lasted seven hours in sessions of two separate days. Justice of the Peace James Renfrow of Farmington Woods sat in as judge of the facts at Justice Nelson's request.

"Testimony for the prosecution was presented by Nelson and his clerk as well as two police officers, according to Paul E. Frezzotte, attorney for the defendant.

"Judge Renfrow stated that he was in doubt after hearing all testimony that an express order was ever given by Nelson," Attorney Frezzotte said.

"The issue of fact was that there was doubt that any such order was given."
