To Try Exam Exemption Idea Soon

Recently the Clarenceville Board of Education authorized exam exemptions for students who receive no mark lower than a B in a given class for each of the three marking periods.

This was put on an experimental basis only, and will be tried for the first time when exams are given at the high school for the first semester.

This B in the classes does not mean a B average, it means all B's or A's in the classes. Therefore, a student with two A's and a C+ is not exempt from the exam.

If a student is exempt from an exam, but requests to take it, he may make arrangements with the teacher to do so.

After the administration has had a chance to evaluate the exemption to determine its merits, it may continue to be a practice at CHS.

Settled in New Building

Clarenceville High students are now settled in the new building located across from the old one on Middlebelt Road.

The building was designed by W. T. Anicka and built by The Wallace Construction Company. The ultra-modern building now contains 24 rooms, but in the future a home-making department, shop, music room, gymnasium, auditorium, and a pool will be added.
