## Falcons Edged Out In Final Seconds

The Farmington Falcons lost a heartbreaker to the Berkeley Bears on the Bears' home floor last Friday night, 59-55.

It was the Falcons' third consecutive loss against an equal number of wins.

Pontiac Northern continued its winning ways to top the Inter-Lakes League title further out of the reach of other league contenders. Northern has yet to be defeated in six league games.

Berkley got off to an early lead and by the end of the first quarter was ahead, 18-12. But the Falcons came back strong in the second quarter and led by Harvey Gashman, pumped in 19 points while holding the Bears to a mere five.

In the opening portion of the third quarter, Farmington continued to roll and at one point had stretched the margin of lead to ten points. But the Bears began coming back in the last minutes of the canto and by its end had reduced the lead to six points, 47-41.

With just 23 seconds left to play in the game the Bears moved ahead and the buzzer sounded before Farmington could score again.

This Friday the Falcons will be going against Walled Lake with whom they are now tied for second place in the Inter-Lakes League.

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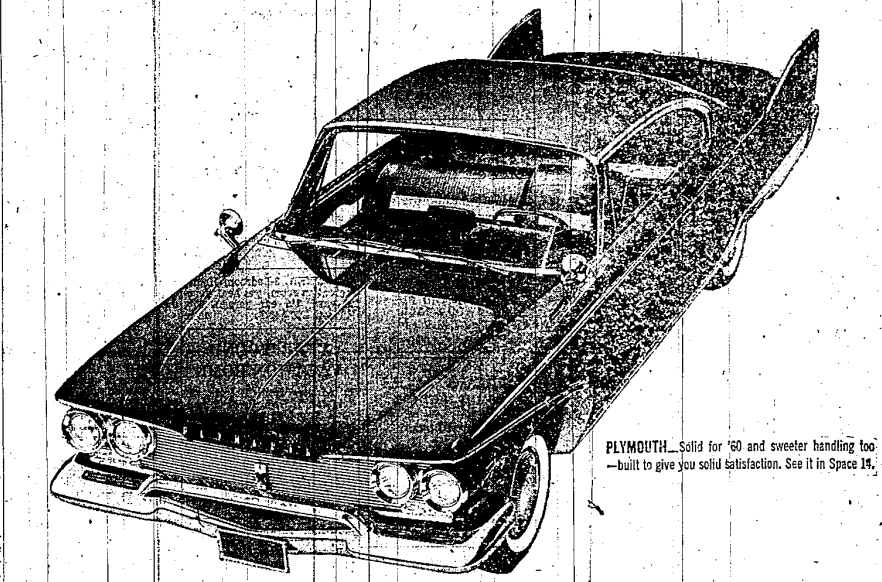
**Statistics Show Chapman Leads Falcon Cagers**

Statistics don't lie. It is Harvey Chapman who has led the way for the Farmington Falcons thus far this cage season. Figures released by Athletic Director Jack Cotton this week showed Chapman with 68 points thus far this season; more than double the total of any other player on the team. His percent is also impressive. His 68 connections have come on 162 giving him a 42 percent shot-made mark. Chapman is also way out front in the free throw department. On 67 attempts he has connected 53 times for 79 percent.

Following Chapman in points is Bill Smith with 33. His percentage is low, however. His attempts number 111 giving him only 29 percent made on field goal. John Anderson, regarded as the most improved player on the Farmington club, is next with 28 points on 47 attempts for a 59 percent completion record.

Anderson stands out as the top rebounder on the team. He is credited with 64 on offense and an equal number on defense. Smith and Chapman follow him in this department.

Following Anderson in rebounding statistics have been drawn up, Farmington has scored 587 points for an average of 49 per game. Their opponents have scored 532 or a per-game average of between 52 and 53.



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
