Ask No Guns If Shining Deer

A legislative proposal designed to plug a poaching loophole in a present game law has been endorsed by the Conservation Commission.

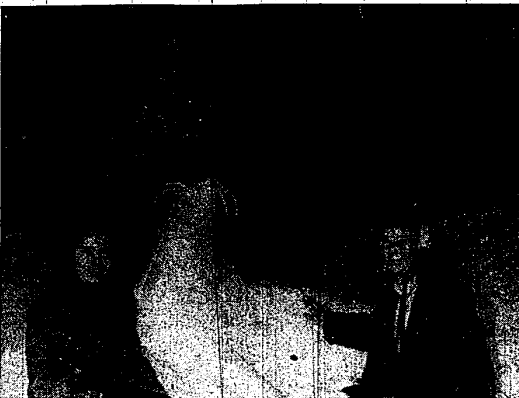
The proposed change would make it illegal for persons to shine deer at night while possessing or transporting a weapon. Under the current law, persons are within legal boundaries to shine deer provided their weapons are either disassembled, or encased, or carried in the trunk of an auto.

E. E. Tucker, head of the Conservation Department's law enforcement section, states conservation officers have a difficult task coping with those who merely play lip service to the three options. "He adds that poaching by deer shiners is on the increase. They are causing problems facing his field force."

Tucker points out there is no logical reason for transporting weapons at night since the regulation on shooting, hunt's prohibited during the general hours of darkness.

Winter Squash

Winter squash can be baked or peeled, boiled and mashed if you choose to, but it keeps the water to a minimum! Otherwise, you have a watery vegetable to serve. 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Major Health Advances Appear Near at Hand in Michigan

Major health advances appear near at hand in Michigan, according to Dr. Albert E. Heustis, state health commissioner.

"We believe we see signs both nationally and on the state solutions for heart disease, cancer and strokes," Dr. Heustis writes in the December issue of the state health department magazine. Heart disease, cancer and strokes rank as the top three causes of death in Michigan.

"The work of the Michigan Department of Health in 1959 gave strong hints of the health improvements ahead," Dr. Heustis said.

As an example, he mentioned that two cancer centers isolated in the state health department laboratories are being readied for testing by the Cancer Chemotherapy Center of National Institutes of Health.

In another significant advance against cancer, the state health department has developed a method for testing cancer agents without using laboratory animals. The method was devised under a contract with the Cancer Chemotherapy Center.

Other research advances included further testing of Synematin B, a penicillin-like antibiotic isolated and patented by the state health department in 1959. The antibiotic has proved of value in treating gonorrhea, syphilis, lymphoid fever and some forms of meningitis.

Dr. Heustis added that major advancements also appear close at hand in child health, sanitary engineering and other vital phases of public health.

In child health he cited a study being made by the state health department that may reduce the incidence of cerebral palsy. The study is aimed at learning if certain birth con-

ditions cause the brain damage that results in cerebral palsy. This study also is being made in cooperation with the National Institutes of Health.

In sanitation, Dr. Heustis lauded area-wide approaches being taken to solve sanitation problems that stretch across governmental boundaries. These problems, most of which concern disposal of sewage, have been especially troublesome in populous southeastern Michigan.

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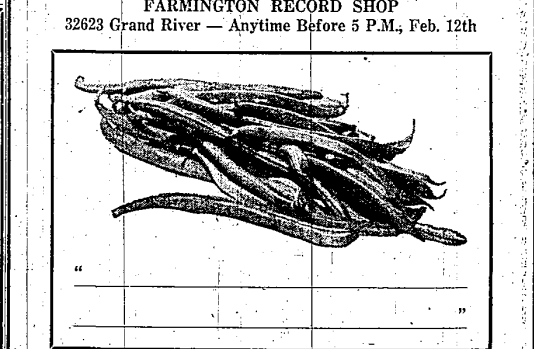
