## 15 More Institutions Added To AAUW Eligible List

Fifteen colleges and universities have been added to the list of institutions meeting requirements for membership in the American Association of University Women. It was announced today by Mrs. David Mills, membership chairman of the Farmington branch.

All graduates of these institutions are now eligible for membership in the Association.

The new institutions, added to the list by vote of the AAUW Board of Directors, on recommendation of the Association's Committee on Higher Education, are: Alma College, Alma, Mich.; Florida A. and M. University, Tallahassee; Henderson State Teachers College, Arkadelphia, Ark.; Marquette University, Milwaukee, Wis.; Marycrest College, Davenport, Iowa; Marymount College, New York City and Tarrytown, N. Y.; Mount Saint Mary's College, Los Angeles, Calif.; Stephen College, Chicago; Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Okla.; St. Joseph College, Hartford, Conn.; Stout State College, Menomonie, Wis.; University of Bridgeport, Bridgeport, Conn.; University of California, Davis; University of Houston, Houston, Texas; and Westminster College, Salt Lake City, Utah.

The addition of these institutions now brings the AAUW list to 445 colleges and universities. Those whose graduates are eligible for membership. To be recognized for AAUW membership, these institutions must have high academic standards, a substantial foundation in the liberal arts, recognition of women in faculty and administration, adequate provision for women students, and maintenance of academic freedom.

"Membership in the AAUW," Mrs. Mills said, "provides an opportunity to join with other women graduates in a practical, constructive contribution to the functioning of democracy." The AAUW has over 141,700 members in 1451 branches located in the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and Guam.
