FHS Wrestlers Shooting for Championship

The Falcon wrestling team has set its sights on the conference championship for 1950. The league meet will be held at Pontiac Northern this Saturday.

Farmington and Berkeley should be the top contenders, with Pontiac Northern close behind. According to Coach Fred Farmington, the team which gets a top performance from each of its men will win the title.

Five Falcon matmen have not been defeated in Inter-Lakes competition. These are Bob Cook, at 112 lbs.; John Wagner, at 133 lbs.; Jerry Cassell, at 155 lbs.; Lonzo Gerton, at 145 lbs.; and Dick Lam, at 154 lbs.

Dave Scherer, 95 lbs.; Bob Maur, 105 lbs.; Dick Cook, 120 lbs.; and Randy Jordan, 127 lbs. lost only one league match. Cook defeated Milford Grove, the defending conference champion at 120 lbs. in the meet with Walled Lake two weeks ago.

Coach Fred is, as yet, undecided as to who will wrestle in the final three classes. The probabilities are Chuck Johnson, Bill Ullrich, Irv Nikkila, and John Dempsey.

Last year the Falcons placed second to Berkeley at the conference meet which was held at Farmington. Jerry Cassell is the defending champion at 133 lbs. Dan Resner and George Pawett also took first place ribbons.

Preliminary matches in each weight class will begin at 2:00 p.m. Saturday in the Northern gym. Consolation and final matches will start at 7:30. Student tickets will be sold at each session; adult tickets will be sold \$6.00. All tickets will be sold at the door.

The Farmington Falcons put on a tremendous spurt in the second quarter of their game with Waterford and went on to win 54-46.

As the game got underway the teams appeared to be very evenly matched. Waterford forced the Falcons to play the quarter to take a three point lead.

Then the Falcons exploded with some fancy shooting and rugged backfield work. They quickly took over the lead and built up a 32-14 halftime margin which proved to be too much for the home team to overcome.

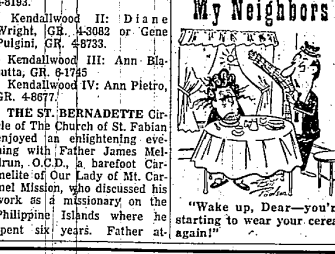
