It prohibits overhead signs from extending over sidewalks more than 15 inches and all "stick out" signs less than 12 feet high from the building.

The general feeling expressed was that such an ordinance might be needed later but that, in view of present business conditions in the downtown area, nothing should be done to limit merchants from attracting more business to their stores at the present time. It was suggested that all concerned auto dealers and other parties get together and present their case to the City Council.

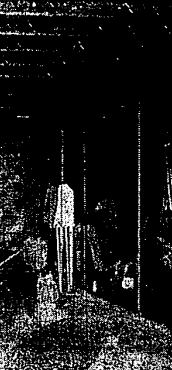

Improvement of state hospitals is the main goal of the AAUW in Michigan today, according to Mrs. Edward F. Latulipe, State Legislative Chairman of the American Association of University Women.

This was disclosed in an AAUW Survey in which 15 AAUW branches searched out the facts and evaluated them objectively. The Michigan State Judges Association is joining with AAUW in a state wide program to carry these needs to the public.

All six of the state hospitals are being renovated. In Farmington, the new building at Traverse City, Newberry, Pontiac, Northville, Kalamazoo and Ypsilanti, were built to care for mental patients and are equal to the needs of children.

In every hospital, the survey report states, children are housed with adults in every hospital. This is a problem. Children need a complex service, the report continues, education, recreation, the development of character, which help them learn to live together. This, the report states, requires the teamwork of many kinds of personnel, personnel especially trained to care for children. But according to the minimum standards of the American Psychiatric Association, the survey says, Michigan's hospitals are badly understaffed.

"Because the children at Hawthorne Center, Lafayette Center, Children's Psychiatric Hospital at the University of Michigan receive excellent care and treatment," says the report, "many people may not realize that the situation is different in the six state hospitals which have 427 children."

Still another problem, according to Arthur E. Moore, Oakland County Probate Judge, is the large number of children in the state who are in the custody of the state. The report lists 137 on November 30, 1949.

The Joint Committee of AAUW and the Michigan Probate Judges Association points to specific ways in which this situation may be improved. One is separate facilities at the state hospitals. Another is to place children's units at Northville, Pontiac, Ypsilanti, and Traverse City State Hospitals, in the new building of the old Mary Muff facility at Kalamazoo State Hospital into a 100-bed children's unit.

The Joint Committee is also suggesting additional staff, especially trained to care for children, and better program in the hospitals.

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### PFC John Ronk Leads Way in Rebuilding Korean Orphanage

If the children of the Sung Kah Orphanage in Pusan, Korea were asked to name their favorite GI, chances are PFC John Ronk would be the unanimous winner.

Bill Korea experienced one of the worst typhoons that ever struck this country which struck his family with volupitous fury. His wife and two children were killed and thousands more were left homeless as a result of the typhoon.

The Sung Kah Orphanage was almost destroyed leaving the 71 children who lived in the orphanage without a home with the severe Korean winter coming on.

PFC Ronk, along with his regular military duties, took upon himself to rebuild the orphanage. It was not an easy job.

With the assistance of some of his army buddies he set up plans for the new building and set right to the construction work. The men worked long hours, and were able to complete the structure before winter set in.

Miss Pum Sook Park, director of the orphanage, wrote a letter of thanks in behalf of herself and the children of her orphanage. In her letter she pointed out the fact that, had PFC Ronk not undertaken the rebuilding of the orphanage, the children would actually have been homeless as there was so much damage that they had no other home to go to.

Both John and Phyllis Ronk's wife attended the Farmington schools. Phyllis now lives in Milford, Mich. She is the former Phyllis Long.

PFC Ronk is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Ronk of 3127 Harlow Farmington.

### Plantings Can Be Planned for Snow Control

Put on your boots and take a walk around your yard—and take the man of the house with you. Wintertime is the season to make up snow-melting plantings.

Cox suggests you locate plantings to allow space for shoveling snow from walks, porches and driveways.

Plantings can act as snow fences at times. Snow will drift parallel to the direction of the prevailing winds, and as the winds shift, so does the snow.

Cox explains that anything which interrupts the wind will slow the wind down enough to make it deposit snow. For instance, if the wind blows across your yard and comes to a row of shrubs along the sidewalk, the wind slows down and deposits snow just over the shrubs and onto the sidewalk.

In this case, it is better to locate the row of shrubs farther away from the sidewalk, so that snow deposits before it gets to the walk.

Plantings can be located so that snow is deposited before it gets in your way, or they can be placed so that the wind is not interrupted until it is beyond the walks and driveways, so that you'll have to study the way the wind blows in your own yard.

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system would be further assumed.

An outline of the work that will be required and a breakdown of the estimated cost for the entire project was made by Manager Scheffert for the Council.

The cost for lines to service the newly annexed area south of Nine Mile was estimated at \$12,000. A 16 inch line and accessories coming up Farmington Road from Eight Mile to the site of the two city wells on Nine Mile west of Farmington Road would require another \$73,000.

A 16 inch line presently runs from this well site along the expressway to Gill Road and thence north to the storage tank. This line would be added to carry water of the Detroit water. It was determined, however, that this was far from adequate. Another line would have to be run from Nine Mile Orchard St. cost estimate for this work is \$40,160. This line would be continued through the proposed parking lot east of Farmington Road and south of Grand River swinging over to follow reforested Wagner St. and then down to the well site in city park. This would require another \$36,750.

Added to these totals was \$26,400 for engineering fees and other contingencies, boosting the total to \$117,000.

The need for a pumping station accounts for the remainder of the estimated cost. This station is called for in the city of Nine Mile and Farmington Road and will require an estimated \$70,000 expenditure.

To emphasize the need for such a pumping station, it was pointed out that there is a 110 foot differential in elevation from the base of the city reservoir north of the cemetery and that at Nine Mile.

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### Get My Deal On A 1960 Pontiac Before you buy

In last week's issue of the Enterprise, C. J. in the feature article on the Farmington City and Township Public Library a serious error appeared. It stated that the library was getting some fancy new black enamel name plates soon.

At the time the matter of tax support needed to operate the library successfully was discussed at a meeting of the Friends of the Library, I made some pointed remarks about inadequacy of the proposal for three tenths of one mill levy that subsequently was adopted.

It said that not less than five tenths of a mill should be levied and that it would require everyone mill for the library to give the degree of service to the community that it should.

Recently the Board of Trustees of the Farmington Library complained about the inadequacy of the support levied upon the Township Board and the City Council to take cognizance of the problem immediately. Preparation of the budgets will come to them and the people who want adequate library service for Farmington do a little prodding it could be effective.

### Public Letter Box

It stated that a mill was the levy on equalized valuation of all property for library service. Actually only 3 or three tenths of a mill levied for library services here.
