Morlan, Mackenzie, free throws and variable, uncontrolled elements pushed Holly to a 77-66 home court victory over the Clarenceville Trojans Friday night.

Clarenceville's Gene Scholes matched the second best Holly scorer as he counted 11 field goals and 11 charity tosses. He was backed up by Tony Giacobazzi's 17 point on 5 field goals and 5 free throws.

Free throw opportunities gave a pretty good indication of the "elements" Friday night. Holly was awarded 39 free throws to CHS's 24. The Bronco's made an amazing 79 percent of their opportunities, sinking 34 of 43 and missing but eight. The Trojans were able to sink 13 out of their 24 chances.

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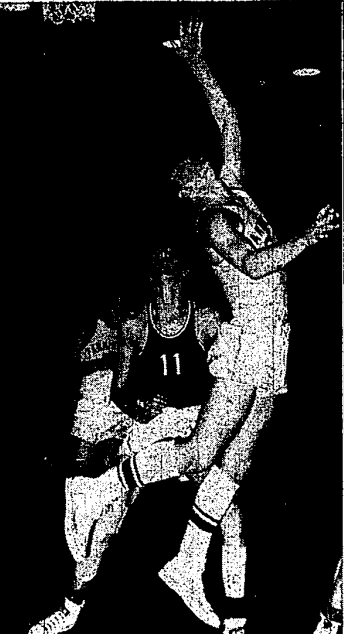
