Requests for 2 'Spot' Zone Changes Made

Two requests for "spot" zoning changes were reviewed by the Township Planning Board at its regular meeting recently.

One came from a Donald Zell, 30435 Ten Mile, who asked that two lots which he owns in Hollywood subdivision be rezoned to something other than residential in view of the fact that they face an industrial area. He did not specify what he wanted the lots rezoned to, but he was given a little hope when Zell's request would be given an affirmative decision. It was emphasized during discussion that the Township Board did not intend to do anything to encourage the industrial properties in this area.

The second request was from a Richard Mutzlik who owns a home at 30635 Shiawassee next to Mather Trucking Company. His complaint was that he was unable to sell his home there, which he purchased about three years ago, because of the trucks and noise. It was pointed out in discussion that the Mather firm had been located here for some time and that such an observation should have been made when he purchased the property.

Action on the rezoning request was withheld pending a report from the planning commission on this matter. There was some talk of attempting to encourage the trucking firm into going into the industrial park to be developed in view of the fact that it is out-growing its present facilities.

Wants School Name Changed

A request by Mrs. Charles Lorion that the Farmington Board of Education consider the name North Farmington High instead of Farmington Northern High was discussed at the regular meeting of the board. Mrs. Lorion pointed out in a letter to the Board that she felt this was a more suitable name in view of the fact that Farmington Road was once known as North Farmington Center. Several stores and other commercial buildings were located in this area in by-gone days the pointed out.

No action was taken, but at least two or three Board members gave signs of being in favor. The matter was tabled for further study.

Schools to Use Park Program

Two Farmington schools will take advantage of the nature program of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority through the free services of the Nature Center at Kensington Metropolitan Park next week.

Charles Damm, park naturalist, will present four lectures on various phases of natural science to Cleveland Elementary School, starting at 9 a.m. on Monday, February 29. The appointments were requested by John Klingenberg, principal.

Three "live" slides from Bondi Elementary School in Farmington Township will travel to the Nature Center at Kensington Metropolitan Park for a lecture on "Metropolitan Wildlife" to be given by Rainer Brooke, park naturalist, at 10 a.m. on Friday, March 4. The group's leader is James Dempsey, fourth-grade teacher at Bond School.

In addition to these services, school groups may also make appointments for guided trips along a Nature Trail in the park by contacting Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, 2550 Grand Boulevard, Detroit.

Brenner's Market Meet Your Merchants

"Fabulous!" was the word used by Harry Brenner when asked what he thought about the business outlook for Farmington.

Harry, father of three, is owner of the market bearing his name located at 10 Mile and Orchard Lake Rd. His brother, Nate, who was equally optimistic about the local business climate.

Both Brenners have had a great deal of experience in the food business. Harry started in 1932 with a store on 12th St. Nate also owned and operated his own store for many years. The brothers decided to merge their talents and experiences and bought the store here in Farmington about two years ago.

Although operating their store is a time consuming task both men have outside interests to which they devote considerable time and energy. Harry's foremost interest is in his association with Haven Farm, a home for physically and mentally handicapped children. He is founder and president.

Brenner's interest in the well being of handicapped children goes back to 1940 when his first child, a son, was born. Now almost 20, Larry Brenner was born with a severe birth injury which deprived him of normal mental development.

The Brenners kept the child home until he was nine years old, in 1949, when he was placed in a residential school.

Mr. and Mrs. Brenner encountered such difficulty in placing the child in what they considered a proper home, that Brenner decided to open a home of his own in collaboration with another man who had experienced the same dissatisfaction in trying to place his handicapped child.

The two men obtained a state license and rented a home in Ann Arbor. In 1952 they moved the facility to Romeo. They then purchased a home in Romeo and it has become the permanent location of Haven Farm.

Haven Farm is a non-profit organization financed primarily by parents of the children boarded there. Ten percent of the costs are met by the United Foundations Fund. Miscellaneous contributions have been made by such groups as the Kiwanis and Lions Clubs also.

"Fees from parents are based entirely on ability to pay," Brenner said. "The top charge is \$3.00 per day, which is far below other private homes," he added.

At the present time there are 22 children boarded at the home. This is the maximum allowed by the state.

Plans are now being made to add to the facility. Brenner's next project will be a rehabilitation center where children who have the ability will be trained to earn a livelihood.

Brenner's wife, Julie, a member of the Farmington Board of Haven Farm shares her husband's enthusiasm in the expansion program, which is expected to become reality within a year.

Nate Brenner, like his brother Harry, is an enthusiastic individual who goes all out for something that interests him. Nate's special interest is in veteran activities. He is a time member of the Ralph Rabe Post of the Jewish War Veterans. His wife, Rhoda, is currently the president of the Rabeaux Auxiliary. Nate served with the 23rd division. The Nate Brenners have two children.

Nate feels that more should be done to promote commercial and industrial development of the Farmington area. He points out that this would take

Sewer Arms N'western Hwy. Extension Suit Is Rejected

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On the arm. The Kendallwood 2 and 3 Subdivision Assn. board directors has voted unanimously in favor of going ahead on the arm, a spokesman for this group added.

A LETTER from the Farmington Board of Education, regarding the extension of the sewer arm, was also rejected by the Township Board go ahead with the Kendallwood arm. The arm would be located on the private Kendallwood sewage disposal plant across from the Dunkle Junior High School were complained about in the letter.

One citizen at the meeting asked whether any guarantee could be given that basement flooding would be stopped with installation of the sanitary sewer. A guarantee such as this is not likely to ever be given. He was told, but installation of the arm could help eliminate some of the troubles presently being encountered.

It was estimated that the Kendallwood arm would require an assessment of \$45 or \$46 for each home site to be served by it. Payments could be spread over a ten year period, it was pointed out.
