Be Realistic in
Child Rearing

We are becoming too expert
in bringing up our children, de-
clares Byron O. Hughes (Ph.D.),
professor of child development
at the University of Michigan.
"Parents are very impor-
tant," admits Dr. Hughes, him-
self the father of six children,
"but they should be more real-
istic and less psychological in
bringing up children. We would
be better off with fewer ex-
perts and more ordinary people."

"We have read so much
about psychiatry and psychology
that we have become bogged
down with all kinds of ideas. We
are chasing our children around
with misspelling psychology and
we have forgotten how to be
normal."

Hughes believes in letting
youngsters think for themselves
and learn to do things for
themselves, "not them" along
with their troubles and prob-
lems. Put up with them as
human beings and give them
credit and support in what they
do, he advises.

"It takes youngsters a long
time to grow up. Rather than
attempt to make adults out of
them, just be happy and con-
tent to make an adult out of
yourself," says Hughes.
