Non-Partisan JP Vote Bill Drawn Up

A bill has now been introduced in the State House of Representatives calling for an amendment to the Michigan constitution providing that candidates for justice of the peace in townships be selected at a non-partisan primary election conducted at the same time as the regular township primary.

The bill was introduced by Representative James Clark of this district. It was drawn up by James Lawson, Farmington Township Justice of the Peace, in his capacity as president of the Oakland County Judicial Association.

It is provided in the bill that: "If upon the expiration of the time for the filing of petitions for the primary election of justices of the peace in any township it shall appear that there are not to exceed twice the number of candidates as there are persons to be elected, then the township clerk shall certify to the township board or election commissioners the names of such candidates for justice of the peace whose petitions have been properly filed and such candidates shall be the nominees for the justice of the peace and shall be so certified. As to such election, there shall be no primary election, and the office shall be omitted from the primary election ballot."

"The names of candidates for the office of justice of the peace shall be printed on a separate non-partisan ballot."

"To obtain the printing of the name of any person as a candidate for the office of justice of the peace upon the official non-partisan ballot, there shall be filed with the township clerk of such township, at least 49 days prior to such primary, nominating petitions containing the signatures of registered electors in the township, equal to or not less than one percent nor more than five percent of the number of registered electors in the township."

Persons wishing to lead their support to the bill are asked to make this request known to their representative in Lansing.

Fiber Weave Affect Prices Of Tablecloths

Fiber affects the cost of the tablecloth, Weave also helps to determine price, says Eleanor Mullikin, home economist at Michigan State University.

Plain color in a plain weave is the least expensive. It may be called 'crash' and often displays irregular yarns. Crash is produced in very attractive, one-colored fabrics. Quality is judged by compactness of the weave.

PATTERN added to a crash fabric increases the cost and may be applied by printing with a machine roller or by hand. The hand methods of block printing are, of course, more expensive. Pattern also results when colored or metallic yarns are woven to form stripes or plaids.

Damask is at the opposite end of the cost scale from crash. Damask is a complex method of weaving "ups" and "downs" in the fabric.
