


Clarenceville Wins, Shares Championship

Falcons Close Season With Win Over Jays

Despite a fourth quarter hiccup with three star players out of action, the Falcons maintained their lead and went on to defeat their arch rivals, the Southfield Jays, 61-55.

Falcon fans who filled Farmington's gymnasium for plenty of action, excitement, and suspense as Farmington added its fifth and last win in conference competition to rank third in the Inter-Lakes League.

Farmington was off to a fast start as Bill Smith grabbed the center jump and moved in to score. The Falcons outplayed the Jays throughout the first

eight minutes and led 17-11 at the end of the first period.

The second quarter proved much the same, but Southfield put up more resistance and faltered 17 points. Farmington surpassed this by one and posted a seven point lead as the halftime buzzer sounded.

THE JAYS rallied to try to overcome their deficit and succeeded in outscoring the home team 17 to 15. For a few moments the Jays moved within one point of Farmington's lead, but advantageous baskets by the Falcons put the home squad out of reach again. The Falcons were at the strong end of the 30-15 score as the third period ended.

Farmington spectators thought their win was certain as the action began in the final period, but with seven minutes remaining, their attitude changed to one of doubt as one of the Falcons' key figures, Bill Smith, was carried off the floor with a sprained ankle. Smith's injury was the first of three disadvantages to plague the Falcons. Both John Anderson, top rebounder, and Harvey Chapman, Falcon sharp shooter, followed "out before" half the quarter was over.

Tension mounted as the Jays fought to take advantage of the Falcons' setback, but the Farmington quintet kept the Falcon head and preserved the victory for the home team.

Even though Smith played only a little over three quarters, he still came out as top scorer for the winners with 17 tallies. Chapman followed with 13 points and Anderson added 12. Dan Matson and Darrell Allen scored six and five points, respectively.

Southfield's high point man was Jim VanBrunt, who also scored 17 points.

To date, efforts to introduce new programs will be sharp, public concern.

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
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
