**Report Whooping Cough on Increase**

Whooping cough cases in Michigan are running more than 50 percent ahead of the number reported in the same period of 1959.

The Michigan Department of Health says that through Feb. 19 a total of 374 cases were listed this year, compared with 224 a year ago.

The department recommends that parents check the immunization records of their children with their family physician to make sure that immunization protection is up to date.

Immunization against whooping cough should be started when a child is three months old, followed by booster doses at ages two and five years.

and then noticed that another car had hit it. The third car driven by Floyd Harvey, 34, of Southfield, had been following the Kaiser car. "I saw him stop to skid," Harvey said. "I did everything I could to stop but the ice caught my car too and I went right into the others. I whacked my head but got out to see what I could do."

Crowell and Harvey pulled the surviving children from the car and took them to a nearby house. State Police troopers arrived on the scene and summoned three ambulances.

"I never saw such a bad one," State Trooper Robert Rank said. The police rushed down the road each way to set up warning flippers before other cars crashed in. They had to lean at the station wagon with crowbars to get the people out.


Kathleen, 9, suffered a concussion; Lynn, 13, a broken neck; Allen, 11, a skull fracture; John, 10, cuts and bruises; and Carl, 7, a fractured right leg. Dr. Joseph Schirle, of Pontiac, a brother of the dead woman, stayed at the hospital all night.

A graduate of Wayne State University, Kaiser was from the University of the South Bend, Ind. A Royal Oak resident for eight years, he had just moved his family into a new home at the time of the crash. The crash occurred as the family headed home from Sunday visit to the home of Mrs. Kaiser's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Schirle in Brighton.

### Proposes CCC Camps Re-Open

Speaking before the Oakland County Juvenile Officers Association at its February meeting, Judge Arthur E. Moore laid out his plans for a Statewide Work-Education Program for Youth.

Judge Moore told the group that youth conservation rather than punishment is what is needed today. He said that nationwide he added that he was looking to PTAs, teachers' federations, churches, parents, courts and state legislature as well as newspapers, radio and television to get backing for Conservation Camps to be opened to teenagers who want to leave school.

With the drive to reorganize the old Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) jobs would be created for youth, Moore said. He particularly emphasized that he would want it to be a police function to show that police are more anxious to prevent crime than punish criminals.

"More important than the 'atomic bomb,' said Moore, 'is the problem of getting youth from 12 to 18 years of age off the street.'

The judge also stated that he would like to work for a lower age limit for joining the armed services. A 16½ year old lower limit is proposed by him.

## Plan Change at Central School

Tentative plans of the Farmington Board of Education are to terminate use of the Central Elementary School for pupil activities. A resolution to this effect was passed at the February 25 meeting of the Board.

In the event the school district is authorized to borrow \$850,000.00 in the special election of March 4, the Board would go ahead with plans to provide additional classrooms at various elementary schools and thus discontinue use of Central for classroom activities.

IT IS THE intent of the Board of Education to then take the necessary steps to provide the administrative services, warehouse, and maintenance services to be coordinated at the Central Elementary School site.

Plans for discontinuing present use of the school building were brought about largely because of the considerable sum of money necessary to renovate it as well as the fact that there is a question as to the effect the widening of Eight Mile Road would have on the school property.
