Ten Mile School's Annual Art Exhibit Scheduled for March 7

Ten Mile Elementary School's Annual Student Art Exhibit will be presented to the public on Monday, March 7, 1950 at 7:30 p.m. This year the display will be limited to five important media used in the children's art program.

These five were chosen as representative of the many materials used. The first area will include paint and will cover adaptations as finger painting, water colors, and poster paint as used in grades kindergarten through six.

THE SECOND area will be clay which is introduced in a plastic form in kindergarten and first grade and becomes more important part of the program in subsequent grades. In these grades a firing clay is used and the results are treated and glazed in the school kiln. Thirly, cut paper decorations and pictures will come under the spotlight as many adaptations etc. are offered as examples of what the children are able to do in this exciting medium.

A fourth area will show chalk and a variety of ways in which it is used and adapted with other materials in the elementary art program. The last and fifth area will comprise printing materials in which ink or paint is applied to a surface and transferred to another surface or material. String printing, potato printing, screen printing and others will be shown as a part of this category.

In each of these areas, after an introduction and a presentation of a few slides by Robert Benjamin, Elementary Art Consultant, the parents and public attending will have an opportunity to work with one or more of these media and to learn something of how the materials are introduced and handled in the classroom.

IN EACH AREA, as the demonstrations and parent involvement progresses, implications of the use of the media by the parent and child at home will be stressed. A list will be available for distribution providing the approximate cost of materials and suggestions as to where they might be purchased.

Art educators feel that many of these educators feel that many of these materials could be widely used at home to provide many hours of fun and adventure for the child with little mess or inconvenience if the parent and child were familiar with the materials needed and their immediate source.
