assessed against Clarenceville District property owners be increased by ten cents per \$100 of assessed valuation for a period of one year (1960) and 1961 for a period of five years, 1962 to 1966, inclusive. The increase would be used for the purpose of paying operational expenses?

The cost of operating school systems, like other businesses, has increased in the past few years. There is presently relatively little industry, and commerce to help carry the tax load, and some of the advantages for residential taxpayers.

Comparative figures show that Clarenceville is spending about \$2.00 less per pupil for school than the State of Ohio, and County average, \$2.00 less than the State of Michigan average and \$7.00 less than the State of Indiana average. Clarenceville's average operating cost per pupil in 1958-59 was \$205.73.

THE PRESENT Clarenceville operating millage levy is 15.05 mills. It has been estimated that the proposed two mill increase would provide approximately \$37,000 in additional operating money. A substantial amount of this would be used to improve salary schedules for all employees of the school system, it was indicated. Clarenceville is not remaining competitive with neighboring districts on its present salary schedule.

Sup. Louis Schuchman stated: "Getting a good staff and keeping it is important to the success of an educational program," he emphasized.

The seven mills referred to in this proposition to be levied from 1961-1965, both inclusive, should not be misconstrued to mean a 7 mill increase. Actually, five of these seven mills are presently being levied but the five year term for said levy expires this year. What is really being asked for, therefore, is a continuation of this present levy plus two additional mills.

Only the millage increase proposition will require an increase in the tax rate. For the average homeowner this will amount to \$10.00 per year. This is based on an average home having a state equalized valuation of \$5,000.

The new schedule for matrons, employed on an hourly basis, provides for \$5 per hour across the board raises. Under this new schedule, the starting wage for matrons is \$1.45 per hour going up to \$1.50 after five years. The new schedule also provides for a \$1.75 per hour maximum is reached.

The starting pay for bus drivers of \$2.00 per hour remains the same as does the \$5 per hour each year increase. But the maximum has been increased from \$2.10 per hour to \$2.25 with the addition of three more yearly steps on the schedule.

A salary schedule for administrative personnel for the 1960-61 school year was approved earlier this year. Administrators will get their regular increments as well as the same increases on the schedule granted to teachers.

of this additional pump, he commented. Total estimated cost for the pumping station and equipment in it is \$70,000.

FROM This pumping station water will be forced through an existing 10 inch main running in a north-westerly direction along the route of present Warner St. to Shawwassee Road. Here it will connect with the main coming along Shawwassee from the city park well site which runs on up to the storage tank. The total estimated cost for this portion of main laying is \$26,790.

Another \$26,410 has been allowed for engineering, inspections, legal and administrative fees and contingencies.

Completion of the new main would result in better water service for the entire community, Scherffius commented. Two ten inch mains would be feeding water to the storage tank. Not only would this permit faster filling but also faster re-distribution, he said.

ALONG The route of the new main, connections would be made with all the present feeder mains. So the water station is called for is a justifier for 13 new fire hydrants to provide for better fire protection.

Approval of the bond issue in April would make it possible for work to be started in June or July and to be completed before the summer is over, it has been indicated.

Discussed next week will be how financing of a general obligation bond issue of this nature is handled and what the approximate cost would be for the average homeowner.

ed boundaries for each school in the district for the 1960-61 school year.

He pointed out during his report that every effort was being made to avoid any undue shifting of youngsters from one school to another in the district. But, he was quick to add that some shifting was necessary because of the rapid development in the area.

Another point that he made was the fact that the Kenbrook School, located in Section 10, was already in the process of being expanded to the point that a new addition was put on there only recently and the new classrooms put into use less than a year ago. The addition at Wooddale is being called for instead of another addition at Kenbrook because of the fact that it has been indicated that development in Section 9 is forthcoming very shortly, Hossler said.

Present enrollment and development trends indicate that a new elementary school may be needed next in Section 34 (east of Farmington Road and south of the Farmington-Brighton Expressway), he concluded.
