It's Official, March Was Cold

If you think March has been unusually cold this year, you are right about it, according to J. P. Thomas, District Manager of Consumers Power Company.

"Reports of the U. S. Weather Bureau at Lansing show an average temperature of 18 degrees above zero for the first 31 days of March," Mr. Thomas said. "The normal average temperature for the whole month of March, based on the last ten years, is 33 degrees."

Normally March is warmer than January or February. Mr. Thomas said, but this year, it is colder than either. The average January temperature this year was 18 degrees above zero and the average February temperature 22 degrees above zero. These temperatures differ only slightly from the ten-year normal average temperature is 24 and for February 26.
