Vitamin Pills Not Cure-Alls

ANN ARBOR - Vitamins and minerals are not "cure-alls" for disease symptoms or ill health, warns a division at The University of Michigan Medical Center. "Many people spend money unnecessarily, especially when taking vitamins, preparations without a physician's guidance," says Betty L. Hight, chief dietitian of the U.M. Nutrition Clinic. "Various types of supplements on the market exaggerate their benefits and lead the public to believe they will cure certain ailments. This can be dangerous, she says, when it causes people to diagnose their own illness and take such preparations as remedies.

As dietary supplements, vitamins and minerals have a recognized place in modern medicine and nutrition and are often prescribed by physicians," she says.
