Farmington First Baptist Church Hosts Bible Lecturer, Jackson

Paul Gerrard Jackson, Bible lecturer and impersonator, will present his dramatic series of Bible characters entitled "Men Who Met the Master" at the Farmington First Baptist Church, Farmington Road and Shawneese, beginning Sunday morning, April 10, at 10:00 a.m. and continuing Sunday evening at 7:00 p.m.

Mr. Jackson will also appear Monday, April 11, through Wednesday, April 13, at 7:00 p.m., having also arranged to present a dramatization of the annual Good Friday service at 1:00 p.m.

At each service Mr. Jackson selects a Bible character and by his talents of personation, makes this character "come to life." A number of the most famous men of the New Testament are included in Mr. Jackson's gallery of portrayals. Each one presents a different relationship to Christ.

The series includes the Bethlehem Innkeeper, the Blind Beggar healed by Christ, the Pharisee who sought Christ (Nicodemus), the Scribe who scorned Christ, the King who mocked Christ (Herod Antipas), the Governor who judged Christ (Pontius Pilate), the Apostle who doubted Christ (Thomas), the Soldier who crucified Christ, and the disciple who betrayed Christ (Judas).

MR. JACKSON gives his dramatic portrayals in full costume, with interpretive lighting effects, and music against the background of drapery settings. The special lighting and audio electronic equipment is operated by his wife who effectively assists her husband as a technician.

An ordained minister of the Gospel, Paul Gerrard Jackson was formerly a professional actor. He specialized in the classical drama, and played a variety of Shakespearean roles in transcontinental tours of the United States and Canada. He received his education at Dartmouth College and the Dallas Seminary of Texas. While pursuing his theological studies in the latter institution, he was also a member of the faculty for four years as a lecturer in Phonetics and Oral Expression in the Department of Homiletics.

Mr. Jackson has made three pastorate in New England before commencing his present country-wide ministry of Bible dramatization. Since then he has traveled over one hundred and fifty thousand miles in the United States and Canada presenting "Men Who Met the Master."

He has enjoyed an extensive ministry as a Bible conference speaker and has made guest appearances on coast-to-coast television programs.
