PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a Special Election will be held in the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, Michigan, on the 11th day of April, 1960, from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 8:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, for the purpose of submitting to the vote of the qualified electors of said City the following proposition:

Shall the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, Michigan, borrow the sum of Ten thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars and issue the general obligation bonds of the City therefor for the purpose of paying the cost of constructing improvements to the Water Supply System of the City, consisting of additional water mains, pumping station, and necessary appurtenances and attachments thereto?

Only those qualified and registered electors who have property in the City assessed for taxes, or the lawful husband or wife of such persons, are qualified to vote on the above bonding proposition.

The places of election will be the regularly designated voting place in each election precinct.
