Colored Easter Chicks Illegal

Easter chicks or ducklings that are colored in gay hues may be novel and attractive, but they are not legal in this state, according to Director G. J. McIntyre of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Under state law it is unlawful to sell artificially colored animals. Included are b b y chicks, rabbits, ducklings or other fowl or game which may have been dyed for otherwise artificially colored.

Nearly every year with the approach of Easter the Michigan Department of Agriculture's feds and standards division receives reports of violations through the selling of artificially colored chicks or rabbits.
