Door Is Opened For Basements

The door has now been opened for basement homes on the lower lots in the subdivision, although with somewhat stubborn resistance by two members of the City Council.

A very controversial issue in recent weeks, the matter was brought up anew at the regular Council meeting Monday night. A written request was filed with the Council by Mr. and Mrs. Donald Summers, owner of one of the lower-level lots in the subdivisions, asking permission to build a basement. The Council, after a long and heated discussion, passed a resolution which would forever hold harmless the city from any and all causes of flooding. It was also passed that this sworn statement would run with the land.

Lengthy discussion followed with clear differences of opinion being expressed by councilmen. When the matter was finally put to a vote, Councilmen Wilbur Brotherton and Howard Thayer along with Mayor Robert Loomis voted for granting the request while Councilmen V. O. Bates and Hugo Peterson held firm in their opposition to basements on the low lots in this development.

Approval was given with the stipulation that the affidavit must first be recorded with the Oakland County Register of Deeds and a notary furnished the city. Approval of the building plans from the subdivision architectural control committee was also spelled out as a requirement before the permit would be granted.

\$42,000 from special assessment bonds.

A balanced general operating budget is called for. THIS IS THE general operating budget only, it should be emphasized. An expenditure of another \$133,770 to meet present water and sewer service expenses and indebtedness is called for in addition to this. The major expense is for operation and maintenance. A sum of \$30,000 has been set aside for this. Another \$38,710 has been earmarked for debt retirement and \$3,000 for a replacement fund having a balance of \$12,600.

The major portion of money to meet water and sewer obligations will be forthcoming in water collections; a sum of \$106,000.

A complete text of the proposed city budget will be available for public inspection in the office of the city manager within the next week to ten days, it was disclosed at the Council meeting.

total assessed valuation in future years will more than offset the additional amounts that will be required to meet principal and interest payments after the first year on the bonds which would be sold.

FIGURING both principal and interest costs over the 15 year period, it was determined that the total cost for each water user for this project would run around \$172, or around \$11 per year. Since this is an average including industrial and commercial properties as well as residential, it was pointed out that the cost would be even less for many homeowners. Those having homes in the average range, with assessed valuations of \$7,000 to \$8,000, would be paying only \$7 or \$8 a year.

Based on best information available at this time, Farmington City will be paying for Detroit water at the total cost of \$101 per 1,000 cubic feet or approximately 13¢ per 1,000 gallons. If this rate holds firm, and there is no reason to believe that it will not, there will be no need to increase the water rates presently being charged, city users for well water, city officials have stated.

CONVERSION to a Detroit water supply, with improvements in the city's water system being made at the same time, will cut present maintenance expenses substantially, City Manager Scherffus has asserted. The projects called for in conjunction with the proposed conversion will also provide the city with an adequate system to meet ultimate needs easily, he has said.

Having an assured adequate water supply and having gotten rid of the extremely hard water presently being supplied from wells were two of the biggest advantages mentioned by those advocating the conversion.

Hope was expressed that there would be a record turnout of voters at the polls Monday so that a truly representative picture would be obtained of what residents really want in the way of water service in the future.

Section 24 to the north.

OTHER AREAS where higher zoning standards than originally planned were agreed to at the joint conference was the area immediately to the west of Farmington City in Section 26 and the undeveloped portion of Section 33, west of James Road between 8 and 9 Mile Roads.

That portion of Section 24, Expressway was upgraded from RA-2 to RA-1 and the portion below changed to RA-2. The southeast corner of Section 22 was also proposed to be changed to RA-1 zoning.

A resolution of intent to adopt the revised zoning, map and proposed new zoning text will come up for consideration at the next regular Township Board meeting Tuesday, April 12.

Approval of a resolution of intent by the Township Board will pave the way for the setting of a public hearing date by the Township Zoning Board.

Two separate requests from the Farmington Baseball Boys organization were granted by the City Council Monday night.

One was for use of the city park ball diamonds for another summer baseball program and the setting up of a refreshment stand in the park and the other for permission to hold a kick-off parade on June 4.

One of the stipulations made in approving the first request was that the organization agree to take down the refreshment stand immediately following the conclusion of the summer baseball program.

City Okays Parade, Park Diamond Use

Wood Creek Village Road Administrator Richard Norwall submitted a letter of resignation at Tuesday's meeting of the council.

Norwall expressed a feeling that the funds allocated for road maintenance are inadequate to take the job properly and further stated that he didn't feel he could go on just doing the job half way. Council members pointed out to Mr. Norwall that all communities have the common problem of operating on a budget and that there just isn't money enough to satisfy every need as it arises.

President Clark and all council members requested that Mr. Norwall reconsider his move. They gave him unanimous vote of confidence for the job he was doing with the tools available. Mr. Norwall had to leave before the meeting was adjourned, his letter was left un-read as the meeting terminated shortly thereafter.

consideration should be given to this suggestion.

ANOTHER city-at-large project planned is the paving of 3500' Street from 3500' to Farmington Road. The cost for this work would be \$8,500.

Proposed to be done on a "pay as you go" basis, the action of the council are two small projects: the paving of Williams St. from State to the boulevard and New Allis Lane Park 4th subdivision and the paving of Cass from State Street to Allis Lane. The bid for the second project was set for the second Saturday.

Council action was promised at a special meeting set for this Tuesday, April 12, at 8 p.m.

The Oakland County Road Commission has already reviewed the bids for the projects they will be shared and agreed to take action as soon as the Council has approved the awarding of bids, Manager Scherffus added.

He expressed hope that there would be no delay in carrying out this work could be started within the next month and be completed some time in July.

Swimming Club Memberships Now Available

Formation of the Farmington Swimming Club, offering private swimming facilities for all in the area was announced by the Farmington Country Club this week.

The pool to be built will be located on the Country Club grounds at Hargerty Road and 12 Mile and will be situated just south of the present golf clubhouse on "Hickory Wood" country club officials stated.

MEMBERSHIP in the club will be limited to 250 charter members and will entitle whole families to use the facilities. Farmington Country Club membership is not required to become a member of the swimming club, it was emphasized. It was pointed out, however, that only a limited number of such non-country club memberships would be available and would be handled on a first-come, first serve basis.

A 30 x 60 foot pool varying in depths from 3 1/2 to 6 1/2 feet is called for, as well as a spray-type kiddie pool 20 feet in diameter. There will be two diving boards and a large cabana and sun deck.

A complete bathroom will have both locker and shower facilities and heating will be provided for to increase the length of the swimming season, it was indicated. There will also be a snack bar.

THE POOL will be open from May 1 to September 1 and the pool area completely fenced. Besides a manager to supervise pool area activities, there will also be life guards on duty.

Area residents have been invited to visit the country club and look over present facilities.

It was indicated that the swimming pool and other proposed swimming club facilities would be ready for use for the current swimming season.

CAIRNS, answered another question about the \$3,000 allocated for voting machines. He explained that this is the rental fee which will later be applied to the purchase of the machines.

Justice of the Peace Robert Nelson made a proposal to delete the \$24,000 from the budget proposed for a future site of the township hall and police headquarters and place that sum in a separate fund to be used time to enforce project zoning. The motion was defeated.

A motion to authorize sale of lots 77 and 78 of "Assessor's Richmond, State & Subdivision (Owned by the Township)" was carried. The lots, both small in size, are located at Rockwell and Grand River. At the present time no purchase offers are pending.

Prior to the adjournment of the meeting a resolution was presented from the floor by Charles McCaughy to increase the size of the zoning board from 4 to 7 members and that the following three men should be appointed: Robert Burton, Norman Libbert and Dr. Walter Grimaldi. The motion was defeated.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:30 p.m.
