a much better looking building than one of all cement block construction.

When approval was finally given after lengthy discussion a stipulation was included prohibiting the erection of any other building within 50 feet from this one. It was the feeling that this would be added protection from any possible fire hazards.

SINCE CITY water and sewer lines do not presently extend to the Nibley-Dancey property, the company proposed that no toilet facilities be required in the building and that they be allowed to use the facilities already in at the nearby company storage warehouse. The Council was not agreeable to this. The putting in of a small septic tank and drain field to serve this building instead was agreed to by company officials.

As soon as city water and sewer facilities are extended, the company will be required to tie-in, it was further stipulated.

Last year in Farmington the Lions Club arranged for examinations for all of the residents of the Boys Republic as well as for many other people who were unable to afford this care. The club also arranged to provide glasses for individuals in the Farmington area.

The club also contributed to the purchase of canes for the Little League, Boys State, Welcome Home for the Blind, Penitentiary House, the Farmington Library, hospital care in connection with sight-saving, and the Leader Dog School. Any blind person can obtain a trained leader dog from the school without charge.

Home Business In R-E Denied

A request which had been pending for some time to permit business of a home occupation nature to be conducted in an area zoned R-1E (residential one-acre) was rejected by the City Council at its special meeting Tuesday night.

Although the proposal was to permit home occupation business in all R-1E zoned areas in the city, it was made specifically by Richard Kelly to permit, continuance of business operations from a home owned by him on Farmington Road just south of the Shell service station at Alta Loma.

Since Kelly was using the home for business prior to zoning of the present city adoption ordinance, he has been permitted to continue to do so. But, now he wishes to sell the home and would have liked the new tenant to be permitted to do the same.

A petition by several Alta Loma residents in opposition to approval of the request was filed with the city and residents were given notice of their objections personally. They made it clear that they were not prepared to expand business operations to the point that it would be detrimental to nearby residential property.

Teacher Retirement Policy Under Study

A proposed retirement policy requiring that teachers in the Farmington public school system retire at age 65 is now up for consideration by the Board of Education.

Establishment of such a policy has been recommended by the School Citizens Advisory Committee.

It was agreed that teachers should be given an opportunity to review the proposed policy before any action is taken.

Cystic Fibrosis Chapter Here

Announcement was made this week of the formation of the Cystic Fibrosis Chapter, Inc. at 23233 Violet St.

Persons having a child with Cystic Fibrosis or knowing of a child with symptoms of such disease are asked to contact Mrs. Ralph Hunt at GR 4-4665 or GR 4-4842. Those interested in learning more about the disease are also invited to call, it was indicated.

Cystic Fibrosis is a children's disease which generally shows up in the child's first year. Initially, the symptoms are chronic coughing, difficulty in breathing, a large appetite but small gain in weight and bulky diarrhea. These symptoms progress with recurrent bouts of pneumonia, the development of a rail-thin body and over-sized chest, protruding abdomen and clubbed fingers.

The children are pale and their lips are sometimes blue with dark circles being noticeable under their eyes.

Death results from starvation, pneumonia, suffocation or heart failure.

The basic cause of this childhood disease remains unknown. About one child in every 600 is stricken with it. The total number of cases nationally each year is over 7,000 and of this total about half will die before reaching seven years of age; it was emphasized.
