The Michigan Education Association is co-sponsoring the tour and members of the group will be teachers and school administrators from all sections of the country.

The study will take the group through England, Netherlands, Belgium, West Germany, Switzerland, Austria, Monaco, Italy and France.

Group members may earn academic credit for participation in the study. The group leaves from New York July 4 and returns to New York August 4, traveling by air.

Mrs. Coveyou has seventeen years of experience as teacher in Michigan schools, eleven of which in the Farmington School District. The 4th grade teacher is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin.

The European study group is part of the world-wide program of educational travel sponsored by the National Education Association. Approximately fifteen hundred teachers will participate in these travel experiences this summer, many of them earning academic credit.
