

# What's New at the — LIBRARY

The Library received the General Fund Grant for the year ending June 30, 1960, this week. This makes a total of \$89,57 for the year 1959-1960. The library is now in a position to improve and expand its services. A report of expenditures from State Aid funds is required annually. Library receiving this year grant serve a total population of 4,432.73.

The legislature has appropriated \$200,000 for state aid grants in 1960-61, the same amount as last year. Since next year's payments will be made in the 1960 census, the per capita income will be used to determine the total population eligible to share in the 1960-61 grants may be 6,000,000 or more.

Most of them were new mystery titles that included Garve, The Golden Death; Hobson - Death on a back bench; McDonald - The Last of Adrian Messenger; and The Adventures of Dorothy - Sayers - Bushman's Honeycomb, Five dead herrings, and Gaudy night. Among the fiction titles are "The Leviathan; Robert's With 'night we banish sorrow; essayist West - South of the angels. Added to the reference books are "The World of Lewis Carroll" by Lewis Carroll; "Paris - Handbook for Township Officials, and Writers and Artists Yearbook 1959.

Highlighting the non-fiction titles are: Koester - Sleepwalkers; a history of man's hanging vision of the Universe; C. S. Lewis - World's last night and other essays; White House Conference on children and Youth - The nation's children - 3 vol; Walker - Children's literature; the constitution in action; Adlai Stevenson - Putting first things first; Charles Black Jr. People and the court; judicial review in a democracy; Thomas Gallagher - Fire at Sea; the Morro Castle; Gillette - Stage scenery; and "The American Revolution" by John F. Parker. "I elected and I professed" - gems of wisdom and about politicians; Hendry - Rising North - Circus story; one Singing family story; Norman Cousins - Dr. Schweitzer of Lambarene; Edmund Wilson - Apologies to the troops.
